MY DEAR FRIENDS,

Once again I begin the January letter by wishing you all God's blessing in this New Year. In these unsettled times when no one is able to forecast with any certainty what the days will bring forth, we are brought back time and again to those things which are certain, the sure mercies of God. We have proved them for ourselves. We can say with St. Paul, "I am persuaded that neither life nor death, . . . nor things present nor things to come shall be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord," and to claim with the writer to the Hebrews also that hope which we have "as an anchor of the soul, both sure and steadfast." With a faith like that life becomes simpler; the worries and anxieties recede; and we look forward with confidence.

"He that trusteth in the Lord, Mercy shall compass Him about."

In adopting Morag Laird the Young People's Fellowship have brought to many people in Aberdour a new interest in the work of the Church of Scotland Children's Homes. Personal contact makes a dull title live. Our congregation has made another such link. "Foreign Missions" is a soulless title until it takes shape in actual individuals in far-off lands. From now on we in Aberdour and Dalgety are to be linked with the work in Kenya. We have undertaken (at the request of our own Congregational Board) to be responsible for part of the salary of Dr Wilkinson of Tumutumu. We shall hear from him from time to time, and when he returns on furlough he will come and pay us a visit. As the years pass we shall get to know him as our own missionary. He is a doctor who served during the war with the R.A.M.C., and on the cessation of hostilities he returned to Edinburgh to take his theological course. He is both doctor and minister. His wife is a daughter of one of our missionaries.

They have been working in Kenya since 1946. Dr and Mrs Wilkinson have already moved since we first had word of our "partnership" from Kikuyu to Tumutumu, and there is a likelihood that they will move again, so our interest will not be in a particular hospital or

church, but in the doctor and his wife and their work.

One word on home affairs. The result of the Sale of Work on Saturday, 8th December, was £245. It was a result which gave great satisfaction to all concerned: to the Woman's Guild which worked so hard; to the Congregational Board at whose request it was undertaken; and to all those liberally-hearted folk who have the welfare of the Church at heart. It has enabled us to give with freedom to the many urgent calls which the Church makes upon us, and to go forward into the New Year well prepared for the expenditure which lies ahead of us. We look forward now to the day when we can say, "our buildings are in a good state of repair, and the time has come when we can undertake the much needed redecoration of the hall."

ABERDOUR YOUTH FELLOWSHIP.

On Sunday, the 28th of October, 1951, the Youth Fellowship held their election of office-bearers and the following committee was elected:—President, Miss Mary Bald; Vice-President, Miss Sheila Milne; Treasurer, Mr John Simpson; Secretary, Mr John Amos; Committee Members, Miss Audrey Baker and Mr William Bald. During the month of November the Fellowship entered into discussions on "The Church and its Work." The subject under discussion during December was "The Church and its Opponents," and the most outstanding discussion of the month was "The Church and Communism." On the evening of Friday, the 21st of December, the Fellowship held their annual party which was well attended and very much enjoyed. We were also very pleased to welcome twenty-five members of Inverkeithing Fellowship to our party. In accordance with the usual custom the Aberdour Youth Fellowship devoted Sunday, 23rd December, to carol singing and realised the sum of £14 7s 6d for Church of Scotland Orphan Homes. The subject for January is "What should a Christian be?" or "What would a Non-Christian look for in a Christian?" There is an average attendance of 25. At the end of the year the Fellowship funds were distributed as follows:—£35 to the Children's Home in which our adopted niece Morag is being looked after; £2 to the Bible Society; £2 to the Mission for Lepers; and £5 for the work of our Missionary, Doctor Wilkinson.

ABERDOUR SUNDAY SCHOOL.

The Sunday School Parties were held in the Parish Hall on Saturday, 22nd December, when new decorations added much to the brightness of the scene, these having been provided jointly by the Youth Fellowship and the Sunday School. "Father Christmas" visited the Primary Party in the afternoon when all the children received gifts. In the evening at the Senior Party each pupil brought a gift of an old toy or book which "Father Christmas" called to collect. The children later received apples, oranges and a plentiful supply of balloons. Their gifts were later taken over to Edinburgh by Mr R. Clark, Roselea, Home

Park, in his car, and to him our thanks are due. Warm thanks have been received from the Church of Scotland Children's Homes to whom the gifts were taken. Our thanks for the supply of milk are again due to Messrs Kerr, Beauprie; Inglis, Dalachy; and Rennie, Humbie. A splendid attendance of both teachers and children in the afternoon and evening, and the presence throughout both parties of Mr and Mrs Rutherford, and of Mr H. C. Martin, ensured a most successful Christmas party. On the morning of Christmas Sunday, 23rd December, the children went with their teachers to a special Children's Service in St. Colme's Church, when the address was given by the Minister, the Rev. D. Rutherford, M.C., B.D. In the evening a Nativity Tableau was produced by pupils and the younger members of the Sunday School staff. Solos and carols were sung by members of the staff and scholars. The costumes and scenery added to the appreciation of a large congregation, and great credit is again due to Miss N. Fairley and Miss Simmers for their work in training the choir and producing the tableau, and to Mr Gillespie for officiating at the organ.

The Sunday Schools allocated collections to Foreign Missions, the Santalia Mission, Children's Mission, the Children's Church, C. of S. Children's Homes, Youth and Education, and to the National Bible Society and the Mission to Lepers, and the amount of the joint contributions exceeded £30.
