THANK YOU!

The Financial Statement of the Congregation for 1961 is printed on the back page of this "News". We wish to express our thanks to those members and friends who by their regular giving have made such a statement possible. A recent publication of the Church's Stewardship and Budget Committee has this to say:—"In this materialistic age the ordinary Church member can make a most effective witness by ensuring that the Church is given an hongured place in his budget of personal expenditure. 'Where your treasure is there will your heart be also'. The liberality of the Church member to his Church is usually an index of the depth of his conviction in the Church's cause, of his acceptance of the Faith, of his belief that as God's steward of all those things of which he has temporary use and benefit, he must perforce make some recognition and acknowledgment of the Heavenly Father's goodness to him.'

If God has prospered you in 1961 have you remembered to increase your giving on a Sunday morning?

#### A CHALLENGE

"There are better Christians outside the Church than in it". This is claimed by some people in our parish. It is up to the members to prove them wrong.

#### **ILLNESS**

Our parishes are wide and extensive; our members are scattered over some twenty-five square miles; the work of the minister has very nearly doubled in the last twelve years on account of new building. When the community was smaller than it is now, there was a highly efficient bush telegraph system whereby when little Tommy cut his finger the minister heard about it before the bleeding had stopped. This system is now out of operation, and you can help the minister very considerably by notifying him whenever there is real illness and especially hospitalisation. The work of the Church is not confined to those upon a Communion Roll and he will be glad to visit regardless of whether you are members or not. If you don't take the trouble to notify him, don't say afterwards — "I thought you would have heard." Imagine how long you would have to wait for your doctor if you went on that principle.

#### FRIENDSHIP

The monthly services in the Church Hall are designed as a means of increasing fellowship in the Congregation and the community in general. They take a variety of forms, but with the cup of tea there is the hope that folk will get to know each other better and newcomers made to feel part of the community. A welcome is given to all our services, but if you have not yet had time to make friends join us in those Sunday evening gatherings—the last Sunday in each month.

#### AN APPOINTMENT

Mr Stodart, our beadle and hall-keeper in Aberdour, has found it necessary to relinquish some of his many duties. We are glad he is going to continue to act as beadle in St. Fillan's Church where he contributes so much. Mr and Mrs Hutton of Humbie Terrace have been appointed hall-keepers from 1st March.

#### ST COLME'S CHURCH PROPERTY

A meeting of the Congregation was called for wednesday, 6th December, to consider the recommendation of the Kirk Session and Congregational Board that the properties connected with St. Coime's Church, be now, if possible, disposed of. In view of the fact the County plan for this part of Fife shows that there is to be no more building in the village on a large scale, it was decided to seek the permission of the General Assembly to dispose of the buildings. Later the Presbytery concurred and we now await the sanction of the General Assembly. We have, of course, been considering what to do with the Memorials in the Church. Some, like the Pulpit and the Communion Table, would find a home in a new Church Extension Charge. As for the plaques and the stain glass window, we should naturally want to keep those, and it has been suggested that we convert the gallery of the Hall which is rarely used into a separate Memorial Hall. This would be a suitable place for meetings of the Session and Congregational Board, and for the Choir, and would enable us to develop our youth work more satisfactorily.

#### SCIENCE

#### JEHOVAH'S WITNESS

Are you disturbed by Jehovah's Witnesses on a Sunday morning when you are not at Church? Here is what the S.P.C.K. suggest you should say to them.

"I admire your zeal in trying to put forward your beliefs. I am sure you are a sincere person. But I cannot accept your literature. You preach a cruel and unreasonable god who is going to sweep most of his children away in a horrible battle of Armageddon while you witnesses stand aside and look on".

"I do not believe that you will really like to look at such a wicked thing. You are too kind for that. Yet you make out that God is not good and kind. He destroyed his own children, not because they are morally bad, but rather because they do not join Jehovah's Witnesses. You would not treat your children like that. So you are better than the God you preach . . .".

"You witnesses consider this world hopeless and so you leave it to perish. You make no effort to help the suffering by supporting hospitals, orphanages or other works of mercy. You take no part in seeing that we have a good honest government".

"I believe in the true God, the God of love. Not the God of hate. I believe in the Gospel, that means the good news that God loves us and cares for us. I do not believe your message of bad news. I know what the true God is like. Jesus is the true picture of what God is like. Your unreasonable God is not a bit like Jesus who went about doing good, healing the sick, feeding the hungry, and himself died for us on the Cross instead of destroying us. You are too good a person to be a Jehovah's Witness. Be a witness for Jesus and the God of Love. Spread His good news of the gift of eternal life here and hereafter".

"Thank you for calling and for listening to me . . . Good day and may God bless and convert you".

When the witness has gone, shut the door and pray that you may have as much courage and zeal for your faith as they have for theirs.
