A letter from our own Missionary. Rev. Dr. J. Wilkinson.

> Presbyterian Church (E.A.) Hospital. P.O. Chogoria, KENYA.

Dear Folks,

Kenya has been very much in the news recently with its elections and the coming of internal self government or I. S. G. as the abbreviators call it. The elections were for three different assemblies; Senate or Upper

House, the House of Representatives or Lower House, and the different regional Assemblies. Each election took two days, and were separated from the other elections by two days, and so all took just over a week.

The qualifications for voting were such that we were entitled to vote in the Lower House election only, so that it cannot be said that any preference was given to Europeans in this election. In our area we had a very high turn-out of electors and held the record for two things; the highest percentage poll in which 99.7% of the electorate voted, and the largest majority in our Senate seat where the victorious candidate got 127,000 votes and his rival only 4,000.

All the candidates elected in our district were KANU and with one exception were Roman Catholics. Their election is attributed to intimidation of many areas by a terrorist gang which is still at large in our area, and to the instruction of the Roman Catholic priests to their people to vote KANU. On the other hand there are several other factors which must be taken into account. KANU conducted a much more active election campaign than KADU. Many people felt that KANU would get a majority in the government in any case, and so they may as well vote for the winning side.

Party politics have not affected us much apart from a rumour which was set about recently that our hospital only treated KADU patients. It was said that when you came to hospital the nurses would ask to which party you belonged, and if you were KANU you were turned away. It is not true of course, but we would like to know its origin.

Now the KANU is in power, there is a tendency of the people to regard anything not according to the party line as not done. We hear for instance there is a possibility that Church givings may go down in this area because it is being said that the Church is KADU anyway, and you must give your money to KANU now and not to non-KANU institutions. It remains to be seen whether this has any effect on givings.

Please thank the Sunday School and the Bible Class for the money. I have used the Sunday School amount to replace our textbook of anatomy here which was dated 1914! Because I have begun to teach anatomy again since Dr. Irvine left on leave, I felt the need of a new reference book in the subject so I ordered one costing £7 10/-

The Youth Fellowship will meet after the evening service at 7.45 p.m. and young people over the age of 16 years of age are welcome to join and take part in the study of the Christian Faith.

WEEK NIGHT ORGANISATIONS.

At a recent meeting of the Kirk Session the elders reviewed the week night organisations in the light of current trends. The Kirk Session has decided to disband the present Badminton Club due to the small number attending.

To meet the need of both young and old, it was decided to form two entirely new organisations. One to be known as the CHURCH CLUB. which will be for members of the congregation and those who attend our services, who are over 17 years of age. This will meet on Monday evenings. It will have various activities which will include badminton. table-tennis and other games. A meeting will be announced shortly to discuss the forms which this Church Club might take. The other to be known as the Youth CLUB will meet on Wednesdays. The membership of this Club will be confined to members of the Bible Class and the Youth Fellowship. It will be a games night, and will have a variety of interest.

Mr DAVID WADDEL. Pulpit Tribute — d. 12th March, 1963

When he retired from his post as stationmaster at Alva and Menstrie Mr Waddel came to Aberdour to spend the remaining years of his life. He was already acquainted with the village and soon he made many friends on account of his quiet kindly nature. He was always interested in the work of the Church and when vacancies occurred in the Kirk Session he was an obvious choice. He carried out his office faithfully, as much by his regular attendance at public worship as by his conscientious visitation of his district. He was appointed first to Cullalo Crescent and then later to St. Colmes Crescent. He suffered a great loss through the death of his wife in 1958, but he continued his interest in the church and in the affairs of the community. He

had a special interest in Aberdour Institute, where for some time he was secretary. Since the summer he had not enjoyed good health and it was with great regret that his many friends learned of his death in Cameron Hospital last Tuesday. We mourn the passing of one who was a friend to many.

The Binnings.

One of the most tragic experiences in my ministry in Aberdour and Dalgety has been the passing of the members of the Binning family. Miss Binning died after a fall in Hospital, to be followed four days later by her sister-in-law, Mrs Binning of Ashlea, Hillend, and then later Mr Binning himself in the most tragic circumstances. They were all faithful members in Dalgety Church. Both Mr and Miss Binning were generously interested in the Sunday School and made many an outing and party possible. In his will Mr Binning left the sum of £200 for the use of Dalgety Church.

Mr JAMES HENDERSON. Pulpit Tribute — d. 8th April, 1963,

James Henderson, our oldest elder, died last Monday at the age of eighty seven. He was ordained to the eldership on 30th March, 1930 in St. Colme's Church and so had a very long association with church life in Aberdour. When well he was regular in his attendance at public worship, but in later years his deafness and advancing years made it difficult for him to take any active part. The boot repairer asked who had sewn them and said "There are few men still capable of such skilled work." He was a keen Mason and had an interest in all that went on in the village.

His passing will remind many of the older folk of features of village life which have long since gone, and our sincere sympathy goes out to Miss Henderson in her loss.

Mr DAVID DOWIE.

Pulpit Tribute - d. 13th August, 1963.

Mr Dowie had a very long connection with the life of Dalgety Church. He was first made an elder in 1924, but relinquished the office in 1932. He was again admitted to the eldership in 1952. He was a man who never missed a Sunday at the Kirk if he could help it and on many occasions, when it was not possible to get on a 'bus, would walk the whole way from Hillend. He loved to be in his place at the door to welcome the worshippers as they arrived and give a kindly welcome. He was generous hearted and was most particular that his envelopes should be filled and up to date. Just recently Mr and Mrs Dowie celebrated their Diamond Jubilee and the folk in Hillend took the opportunity to pay tribute to their influence and service. Of recent years he has not had the vigour he once had, but he was always ready to play his part and had a great love and concern for the work at Dalgety.

Our sympathy is with Mrs Dowie in the hour of their parting.

TWELVE RULES FOR RAISING DELINQUENT CHILDREN.

- 1. Begin with infancy to give the child everything he wants. In this way he will grow up to believe the world owes him a living.

- 4. Avoid use of the word "wrong." It may develop a guilt complex. This will condition him to believe later, when he is arrested for stealing a car, that society is against him and he is being persecuted.
- 5. Pick up everything he leaves lying around—books, shoes, and clothes. Do everything for him so that he will be experienced in throwing all responsibility on on others.

- 6. Let him read any printed matter he can get his hands on. Be careful that the silverware and anddrinking glasses are sterilized but let his mind feast on garbage.
- 7. Quarrel frequently in the presence of your children. In this way they will not be too shocked when the home is broken uplater.
- 8. Give a child all the spending money he wants. Never let him earn his own. Why should he have things as tough as you had them?
- 9. Satisfy his every craving for food, drink and comfort. See that every sensual desire is gratified. Denial may lead to harmful frustration.
- 10. Takehis part against neighbours, teachers, policemen. They are all prejudiced against your child.
- When he gets into real trouble apologise for yourself by saying "I never could do anything for him."


"A shilling on the Derby."

Dear Member,

Each year at this time the Congregational Board review the financial position of our Church for the current year and consider estimates of income and expenditure for the ensuing year. They take this opportunity of expressing their thanks to all those who throughout the past months have contributed so regularly and generously.

CURRENT YEAR

The position relative to members and contributions for the ten months ending 31st October 1963 was as follows:—

The amount to be raised by the Congregation during 1963 as stated in the Budget Statement for that year was £2636. Ten-twelfths of this sum amounts to £2197 which amount can be used for a rough comparison with the figure of £1978 above. Such a comparison indicates a possible Budget shortfall of £219 for the year.

St. Colme's Church and adjoining properties were sold for $\pounds 2250$. The sum of $\pounds 1500$ has been received to account of the net proceeds and payment of the balance is awaited.
