

Some of the children who visited Scotland helped by the collections of 1p and 2p coins for the Chernobyl Life Line.



St. Fillan's is currently one year into its link with the parish of Alumenda in Southern Malawi. We are still exploring the possibility of making a significant contribution to building a more permanent church building at a cost of £6,000. This recognises that we were fortunate in the donations we received during the re roofing project at St. Fillan's.

What we have learnt is the severe poverty and poor health that exists in Malawi at present. Further information about our plans to develop this link will be made in a number of ways in the coming months.

Letter from the Manse

How do you relax? Reading detective novels is one of my ways of relaxing. It's great to follow the twists and turns in the story, and find out whodunit. I never get it right!

The Irish author Peter Tremayne has written a series of detective stories set in 7th century Ireland. The main characters are an Irish nun, Sister Fidelma, and a Saxon monk. Brother Eadulf. Together they face common enemies, unravel mysteries, and, along the road, they fall in love and get married.

Before you throw up your hands in horror, let me explain. The author is brilliant at describing the social and religious background to all his stories. In the Celtic Church of 7th century Ireland there were many mixed convents, where monks and nuns lived together; some were married and had children, who were brought up in the Faith. Celibacy, though around as a theological concept, was not enforced by the Church until the second Lateran Council of 1139 under Pope Leo IX.

The Church is always changing, adapting. re-forming, to be able to serve Christ in changing circumstances. St Fillan's has been a Roman Catholic, Episcopalian and now a Presbyterian Church. It has been linked with Inchcolm Abbey, and with Dalgety; it has been independent, and it is now part of a Parish Grouping involving the Parish Churches of Dalgety Bay, Inverkeithing and North Queensferry.

Working together has many advantages, the main one being the ability to pool resources, human and financial, to provide worship, pastoral care and outreach. At the same time, it is important to appreciate the real differences in setting between the Parishes. While Dalgety Bay and Inverkeithing are urban Parishes, Aberdour is a rural one, where expectations of both Church and Minister are very different.

Through working together and getting to know each other, and through honouring different backgrounds and histories, the four Parishes will be able to create real and lasting bonds of friendship and cooperation over the months and years to come.

It is important to ensure that within each Parish there are living Congregations, willing and able to share the love of Christ with all in the Parish. A Church in the community, for the community, is a Church that can serve the needs of the community, in the service of Christ.

St Fillan's motto is "Encouraging people to follow Christ". Let us try and live up to that motto, and through prayer and outreach serve our community, and serve our Lord and saviour, Jesus Christ.

Grieg: In spite of the popularity of his concerto, he revealed his musical skills to best effect as a miniaturist in his piano pieces and songs. He had a wide range of compositions i.e., orchestra, chamber music, piano sonata, folk songs and dances, choral works and incidental music. Probably most widely known is "Peer Gynt" with "Morning" that we all hum and whistle to.

The passing of Pavarotti of course will be a great miss on stage, but fortunately with modern technology his great voice will just go on and on. Surely he will be the first classical singer to reach no 1 in the selling charts.! We will wait and see.

I took the occasion to play Puccini's "Nessun Donna" (no not for the football fans), during the offering the other Sunday, as a commemorative piece (also, li like it) but he came back to haunt me. I paused before opening up as usual for the final bars, and out of the corner of my eye saw the congregation rising to their feet. It was like the Mexican wave, a curious incident.

Plans are beginning to shape up for a special week during the summer holidays in 2008!



BILL CHALMERS

At its September meeting the Kirk Session learned that Bill Chalmers would resign from the active Eldership. Bill's service to the Church has been outstanding. He was ordained an Elder in the Church of Scotland over 50 years ago in St John's, Inverkeithing, and has served on the Session at St Fillan's since 1961.

Bill served as Session Clerk for many years, and as a member of Presbytery, and has been a source of strength and stability throughout his long service to the Lord Jesus Christ and His Church.

At the meeting Bill reflected on the many changes that had taken place during his period of Eldership. These included attendances kept by elders, ordination of women elders, nomination of female moderators to the General Assembly and children receiving communion. It had been a time of huge change with readjustments of churches, dealing with human sexuality issues and recognition of ecumenical issues.

He concluded by asking referring to the quote "It was important that the Church remained a significant force. We are called upon to be a confident church."

As a Congregation, and as a community, we owe Bill a great debt. In saying farewell to him, we thank him for all he has done, and wish him and his supportive wife, Margaret, many happy years together in good health.

THE CHERNOBYL CHILDREN

Who are the Chernobyl children?

In 1986 there was an explosion at the nuclear plant at Chernobyl, then in the USSR. The reactor fallout blew towards the country now known as Belarus where families have been affected ever since. Children are born with abnormalities and cancer kills many before they grow up.

What does the charity do?

The charity was started by Victor Mizzi MBE in 1992 and there are branches all over the UK. The Dunfermline and West Fife Link has been running for 8 years. Each year for a period of 4 weeks the children come here for a holiday. The better diet and clean air improve the children's health considerably.

Where do the children stay?

The children, preferably in pairs, stay with local families. This year the children stayed in Comrie, Dunfermline, Glenrothes, Gowkhall, Kinross and Rosyth. Most of the host families have children or young adults who can help to entertain, but this is not essential.

What do the children do when they stay here?

They go on outings every second day. This year these included Fordell Firs, Leith Waterworld, Dunfermline Fire Station, Deep Sea World, Stirling Castle, Blair Drummond Safari Park, Inchcolm, Dunfermline Glen, local swimming baths and a ceildh! Each year the Dunfermline Rotary Club organise a day of treats for the children.

And what about their health problems?

Some of the children are on medication. When they are here they have free dental checks provided by local dentists in Kinross, Oakley, Inverkeithing, Dunfermline and also free eye tests (and spectacles if needed) at Specsavers, Dunfermline.

Are there language problems?

The children all learn English at school. There is a Russian phrase book for the host families. The Belarussian adult leader who accompanies the children is always available if there is a problem, but usually communication problems are overcome with acting and sign language!

Do they like our food?

Yes. Hosts are flexible with the food they offer to accommodate individual preferences. They provide wholesome food to help recuperation. In some cases the children initially eat very large portions until they

realise that each day they will regularly be offered as much food as they can comfortably eat.

What do the children enjoy most?

Having fun! Most love swimming.

What do they find strange?

One child was frightened by the shower but when his friend accompanied him into the shower they had great fun! Another child remarked on the rabbits at the side of the road and couldn't believe we did not use them for our dinners!

What do they go home with?

Better health, lots of memories and new clothes. Many of the children have only the clothes they stand up in when they arrive. Clothes are donated for them and they get to choose new outfits. Some have never had pyjamas and usually sleep in their underwear.

What about the host families?

The families all say that they gain more from having the children, than they give. All those involved can see the children glowing with health after the four week holiday. After an initial shyness the children are enthusiastic and most gracious about the generosity they are shown.

What does it all cost?

£400 for each air fare plus money for hiring transport, outings etc. Each host family is given some money to buy the children some basic clothing and the charity buys winter shoes for the children to take home.

What can we do?

Aberdour has contributed a considerable amount to Chernobyl Children Life Line over the years. This year so far a donation of £270 was raised by a St Fillab'Musical Supper and £160 has been sent from the ongoing collection of coppers. The local committee very much appreciate our regular contributions.

Can we do more?

Yes! Keep saving our coppers (leave these at church on Sundays or call me to collect on 860151) and support local fund raising events.


