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#### Letter from the Manse

The Church serves wherever people find themselves, from the beauty and comfort of rural Fife to inner city Urban Priority Areas, in hospitals, prisons, and in more dangerous circumstances, like Afghanistan.

A friend of mine changed jobs recently. After some time in a Parish, he applied to the Royal Air Force, to become a Chaplain.

His tales about the training were hilarious, and he appears to enjoy the change is his life. The Rev'd Craig Lancaster was posted to RAF Leuchars, but within days heard he would be taking up a posting at Camp Bastion in Afghanistan.

My prayers are with him and with his wife Katherine, as Craig begins this dangerous deployment.

A report to Presbytery from the Chaplain's Department at the Victoria Hospital showed how many visits Chaplains make to patients, and I know their work is much appreciated.

The Presbytery Clerk, the Rev'd Elizabeth Kenny, spoke about her work at Glenochil, where she is one of the Chaplains. Working with sex offenders and murderers offers her an opportunity to share the love of Christ in very different circumstances from Parish life.

The work that goes on in Parishes and in the Forces, hospitals and prisons reminds us that the love and grace of God are for everyone, not for some only.

We all have pet-hates, and the quoting of Bibletexts wrongly is of my pet-dislikes.

"Money is the root of all evil", someone will say. No, the Bible says: "The love of money is the root of all evil", and that is something completely different.

And on a sunny day, someone will claim cheerfully: "The sun shines on the righteous."

No, the Bible says: "The sun shines on the

righteous and the unrighteous", and so states the complete opposite.

The Prophet Micah lived somewhere between 750 and 686BC, at a time of war, invasion and religious decline. He opposed empty ritualism and injustice, and spoke about the ultimate Divine deliverance in the person of the Messiah.

Micah wrote: "And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God. (Micah 6, v 8).

It is these qualities Jesus epitomized as he ministered in the Holy Land. Through His healing, His teaching and His reaching out beyond the limits of society, Jesus affirmed the worth of every individual in the sight of God, who made human beings in His own image, male and female.

God's sun shines for all, not for the righteous only. And money is not bad in itself, it is the amassing of it for its own sake that is wrong.

If, as individuals, as communities and as nations, we loved mercy, acted justly, and walked humbly before God, the world would be a different place, in which everyone was valued, respected and, yes, loved, as God loves each of us.

Living in such a way is not easy, for mercy and justice are demanding concepts if we apply them honestly. And humility before God demands an honesty about our own words and actions that can be quite uncomfortable at times.

As we draw closer to Advent, let us remember Micah's prophetic words, and the life of Jesus, and prepare in our hearts for the joy we all receive at the coming of God's Messiah.

As Chritina Rosetti writes in the great Christmas Hymn:

"Love shall be our token love be yours and love be mine, love to God and all men, love for pleas and gift and sign".

# World Mission Stamp Appeal 2012

Our congregation collects stamps towards the Church of Scotland's World Mission Stamp Appeal. This year's project is to renovate an existing structure so that chicken rearing can be taught as part of the agricultural syllabus !

The ancient city of Tyre in Southern Lebanon is surrounded by three camps which are home to around 45,000 Palestinian refugees. Many of these Palestinian families who were expelled in 1948 came from farming communities. On the edge of the city the Joint Christian Committee for Social Services in Lebanon (JCC) has set up a small farm. The refugees are learning agricultural skills thanks to a project which began more than a decade ago; this also allows them to maintain their cultural heritage. Since the year 2000 the JCC has organised courses for males and females aged between 14 and 35. The majority of people in Southern Lebanon live off the land around them and the JCC has been using its 4,000 sq. m plot of land there to improve the lives of Palestinian refugees, who are excluded from 70 professions due to their status.

The courses run for four months twice a year, with between 12 and 15 participants. They have generally focused on tasks such as planting vegetables and caring for fruit trees. Occasionally flower arranging, soap making, bee keeping and health lectures have been added to the curriculum, however the JCC would like to extend the scope of the farm project by offering the refugees the chance to learn to care for chickens. They are now developing a building which was formerly used as a chicken coop.

It has been cleaned and structurally strengthened but the JCC now needs further financial support in order to make the building functional and buy the chickens.

The objectives of the project are:

- Include poultry care in the agricultural syllabus.
- Provide students with a new skill they can pursue as a vocation.
- Overhaul and utilise an existing structure.
- Make the farm more attractive to young visitors through the presence of livestock.
- Sustain the farm through additional income.

Key facts about the JCC:

The JCC is the Lebanese area committee of the Department of Service for Palestinian Refugees (DSPR), an integral part of the Middle East Council of Churches.

The JCC aims to empower people to enable them to help themselves through education and vocational training.

The JCC runs two vocational centres for women, one electronics and computer centre for young men and women, and an agricultural centre. It recently opened a library and community centre.

# CHERNOBYL CHILDREN LIFE LINE DUNFERMLINE & WEST FIFE VISIT 2012

On 25th July this year, Alex and I were guests at the "Thank you Do" for hosts, helpers, churches and other bodies who donate to sponsor the Chernobyl children's travel expenses to Scotland.

Some may ask why, when we are at a time of recession in our own country, should we send this money for travel and ask families here to host the children? Well, many of you will remember the Chernobyl Disaster of 1986. In fact, in the Soviet Union was still in place and it took some weeks for countries in the West to be notified. Secrecy in the Soviet Union also meant that the people of Belarus and the Ukraine were not told the full extent of the explosion at the nuclear plant near Kiev either. The radioactive fallout was 90 times greater than Hiroshima. I am sure that younger readers will have heard of the bombs dropped on Japan at the end of WW2 in studies at school.

It is estimated that today more than 2 million people in Belarus still live in contaminated areas. They still till their fields, herd cattle and eat the contaminated produce of their labours. The same is true of large parts of the Ukraine.

Why, then should we help the children of these countries? Firstly, the rise in childhood cancers; leukaemia, tumours and thyroid cancers are rife, from the contamination today. Secondly, heavy metal poisoning has resulted from the tons of lead which was poured onto the Chernobyl reactor.

The Dunfermline and West Fife Link was formed in June 2001 and their aim is to help the children of these areas by boosting their immune systems and offering them respite from the constant bombardment of radiation.

Amazingly, it is estimated that a month staying with a family here, eating nourishing food, resting from the relentless radiation, breathing clean air can add up to TWO years to their life expectancy.

This year Alex's brother, Stuart and his wife, Lee were hosts. They had two 10 year old boys, Maks and Sasha to stay for two weeks in their house with their own three boys. Lee says that the physical change in the children by the time of the Ceilidh at the end of two weeks, amazed her. All the children had their eyes tested. Companies donated shoes, day wear, night wear etc. A Hairdresser donated salon haircuts. (Maks and Sasha did not take up this offer, since they wanted to keep their "mullet" haircuts.)

How could you help?

- \* You could consider being a host family.
- \* You could make a Donation. St. Fillan's helps by collecting copper coins. That does not sound much, but we all know that "if you look after the pennies......"

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#### **Church Hall Management**

Bruce Drever retired from the post of Hall Convenor on May 31st after many years of faithful service, and despite lengthy efforts to find someone to take over from him, no-one came forward to fill the role.

As an interim measure, management of bookings were taken over by Bill Paterson, who established an online Hall bookings calendar on Google. This now allows on-line functional access to selected individuals through a security password procedure. At present Karen Crowe, Catherine Duncan, Sharon Johnston and Andy Bastow can access the calendar so bookings can be taken during Bill's absence when required. So far this on-line calendar has worked well and gives shared information, and no booking conflicts have arisen to date. Generally Hall users have been helpful in providing their forward booking requirements, but this will be even better when all user groups are fully aware of the need for timely information before the start of the school year.

As there is still no prospect of a new Hall Convenor being found, the establishment of a small Church Hall Management team has now been endorsed by Kirk Session. This will be trialled for a year initially, and comprises Bill Paterson, Andy Bastow, and Karyn Crowe.

It is planned that this team will manage and co-ordinate bookings, contracts and charging rates as well as overseeing cleaning, maintenance and minor development of the facilities. Others can be co-opted as needed.

Apart from ensuring continuity, three aspects are priorities for the team:

- i) to establish a more equitable charging regime, taking account of not just times of booking, but total usage including storage,
- ii) to seek volunteer groups to carry out re-decoration and some simple maintenance and improvements (ie stripping ivy) in some parts of the Hall which are easily accessible. It is hoped that this latter activity will have been aided by the information gleaned from the responses to the Stewardship Campaign.

iii) to help our hardworking cleaner and address some of the 'cleanability' issues around the Hall.

Our Hall is a very significant asset and we should ensure we keep it attractive to as many users as possible while still covering increasing running costs.

#### **STEWARDSHIP**

On 8th July we launched our Stewardship campaign with the introduction of our Talents and Time survey. To date we have received 59 responses to our request for an insight into what people would be prepared to do for our church and thank you to all those who have responded.

The survey has produced hidden talents from which we have new people welcoming worshippers on a Sunday morning, five new people (different ones) will be heard as readers in the next few months and various offers have been made to distribute magazines, to help with a cleaning programme for the church and to be involved in gardening, painting and general maintenance.

Stewardship is to be considered as an on-going and continuing event in the life of our church and we will be in touch with all those who have offered their services in whatever capacity over the ensuing months.

Whilst encouraged by the initial response 59 is not a large percentage out of a congregation of 409 (14%) although in relation to an average Sunday attendance of say 120 (49%) it is not too bad. If you have not yet completed a form they are available at the rear of the church so please pick one up, complete it and pop it back into the box and let us know what you can do for your church.

We are already aware that at the next vacancy (and we pray that may be a long way off) the presbytery have decreed that St. Fillan's will become a 50% ministry meaning that many of the tasks currently carried out by our minister will require to be done by elders and members of the congregation. We must be prepared in advance for this.

We are currently considering how best to ensure we involve all of our members on the congregational roll. This will involve visits by your district elder or members of the Stewardship Committee over the next few months.

To meet the challenges of the future and to continue a vibrant and healthy church here in Aberdour we need **YOUR** support. Join with us in making this happen.

#### A Cautionary Tale from the Summer Holidays

## THE LEGEND OF THE BLACK MADONNA OF ROCAMADOUR

Rocamadour, in the Dordogne Region of France, became a site of pilgrimage when in 1166 it was said that the body of a follower of Jesus called Zaccheus had been found buried under the chapel of the Virgin. Until the reformation the pilgrimage of Rocamadour was one of the most famous in Christendom. Great crowds and many famous and important people came such that the interior was adorned with many valuable votive offerings, banners, swords and much else besides.

Above the altar was the statue of the Miraculous Virgin with the infant Jesus on her knee. The statue is in wood, blackened here and there by smoke from candles and may date from the 9c.

Suspended from the roof of the chapel hangs the miraculous bell, dating back to perhaps the 6c, which rings of its own accord to foretell miracles.

In 1173, when William the Lion was King of Scots and St Fillan's was a newly built church, Henry II of England fell out with his feisty queen, Eleanor of Aquitaine, and shut her up in a tower. The household was a royal hell and the four sons took up arms against their father. The eldest, Henri Court-Mantel, pillaged parts of the King's lands near Rocamadour and to punish him King Henry stopped his allowance and paid it to his third son, Richard the Lionheart. Henri Court-Mantel found himself unable to pay his soldiers so he plundered the treasuries of the local abbeys and came to the shrine of Rocamadour where he dug up the body of the saint, sold the famous sword of the hero Roland and rode off with the statue of the Madonna hanging from his saddle. As he was leaving after this sacrilegious action, the bell miraculously began to toll. It was seen as a sign from God.

Henri fled to his castle at nearby Martel, where he arrived with a fever. He felt death was upon him and was stricken with remorse. He confessed his crimes,

whilst his father's pardon was sought. The King was busy with a siege elsewhere but sent a written message. However the messenger on arrival found Henri-Court-Mantel lying in agony on a bed of cinders, a cross on his breast. Soon afterwards he died.

The Black Madonna still hangs above the altar at Rocamadour.
