# THREAT TO ST.FILLAN'S......How you might help

On my visits to homes in both Aberdour and Dalgety Bay the most frequently question I am asked is what is happening now? Where are we as a result of the visit of the Commissioners on 6<sup>th</sup> June and to be frank I have to tell people I do not know and I am not sure if even the Commissioners know the next step of the process.

As we were told at the meeting, the Commissioners were to visit every church in the Presbytery of Dunfermline and were then to report back to Presbytery with their findings by February 2020. Their task was to be completed by mid-2019 and I understand that this has been done.

The next procedure will be for Presbytery to consider their submissions and move to the next step in the process and that is where I am not sure if anyone knows what happens next.

There is no doubt that within the Church of Scotland changes are afoot and we should not be afraid of change if it is for the right reason. In May 2019 General Assembly decided that the number of Presbyteries in Scotland should be reduced from 43 to around 12 so we might find ourselves within a new Presbytery of Fife encompassing St. Andrews, Kirkcaldy and Dunfermline. How that will affect St.Fillan's we do not know.

From our point of view the continuance of St.Fillan's as an independent charge with its own minister and Kirk Session is our priority. We continue to be financially sound and have a relatively healthy congregation at worship on a Sunday morning but is that enough?

I would respectfully suggest it is not. At our meeting with the Commissioners there was not a seat to be had in the church and folk were occupying every available standing space yet our numbers attending church and joining the church as either adherents or members has not risen. This is the crux of the matter in as much as we have to be seen as a church that is growing in membership, a church that can demonstrate its essential place in the village, a church without which many organisations within village life could not exist. So what are we to do? Support the church in whatever way you can and that is not just supporting activities in relation to the hall. We need more people to be seen and visible on a Sunday morning rather than passive and unseen, we need to show that the spirit of God is alive and well in Aberdour, we need to show that anyone looking at our situation will say here is a church that is doing OK. It's been around for many years, shortly to be celebrating 900 years of worship in this place and God willing will continue to do so for many years to come.

The future is in our hands.....let's make it work.

# OUR CHURCH HALL

#### **Bridge Too Far?**



75 years since operation 'Market Garden' we plan to bridge (well provide a ramp) into the Church Hall. It is planned to be a permanent feature in stone and paving, in keeping with the stone steps and frontage, of the Church Hall.

Use of the Hall has grown and continues to grow but better access must be provided. It has been talked about for many years, but the time has come for action!

Groups such as: Babies and Toddlers, Mucky Pups, Festival, St Fillan's Lunches etc would benefit from the provision of a ramp

for buggies, wheelchairs etc and for us to provide accessibility for all.

The difficulty St Fillan's Church faces now is that we are only permitted to keep our buildings wind and watertight as there is a moratorium on capital expenditure. We do feel it is a project that will be in the hearts of many who use the hall. Costs have been obtained of circa £15,000 for a permanent stone ramp.


Once all statutory approvals have been granted and accurate pricing can be made, we hope to make an appeal to the village and the hall users for assistance in raising the required funds to build the ramp.

#### FIVE WEEKS WORK TO RESTORE THE CHURCH HALL WINDOWS!

Few living in the village can remember the Church Hall windows being painted or refurbished but it happened this summer!

St Fillan's Church commissioned Edinburgh Sash and Case Company to restore and refurbish the windows. It was a major project costing £9910. The repair and improvements to the windows started on 8<sup>th</sup> July 2019. Rotten timbers were replaced, windows reroped and counter balanced, three coats of paint were applied and finally the frames were sealed back into the stone jambs with sand and linseed oil mastic. Our Church Hall is a Grade B listed and all works were in keeping with the original construction.

The windows on either side of the war memorial are now openable to provide natural ventilation – a breath of fresh air! The hall is now back in full use by all the village organisations.

# Letter from the Manse

#### -000-

One of my favourite stories in the Bible is referred to usually as '*The woman caught in adultery*'.

The title alone should be a warning to us all – without wanting to be too unkind, the woman dragged out and thrown into the sand in front of Jesus can't have committed adultery on her own – and this begs the question: "*What happened to the man involved*?"

But those ready to condemn, then, and now, forget this inconvenient truth.

Instead, the hypocritical tormenters in the story, and many bullies today, go in for a cowardly act of public shaming. They were NOT interested in punishing adultery – they were trying to kick up a fuss, and were trying to ensnare Jesus

They were the 'Holier-than-thou' brigade, picking on the defenceless, and trying to trap Jesus.

Some people on Social Media engage in much the same practices, when they scream about the misdemeanours of politicians, celebrities, and others.

These cyber bullies are not interested in preserving marriage, or upholding standards in public office; instead they appear to take delight in trying to shame people publicly, as a form of self-righteous entertainment.

Their own lives probably would not stand up to much scrutiny at all, as no-one is perfect.

Jesus challenges the men who dragged the woman in to His presence, saying that the one without sin should cast the first stone. Well, that would have been the oldest or most senior man, then. And confronted by Jesus' challenge, these bullies realise suddenly they are in no position to cast any stone – first or last – and they leave, silently.

At least these men had to accuse the unnamed woman, and attack Jesus, face to face. So many tormenters now hide behind computer screens, and accuse, bluster, and bully from the safety of anonymity or fictional names.

Some of the folk who have come to speak to me recently had sad accounts of them and even their young children, being accused, bullied, and harassed from a distance.

In a recent Sermon, a colleague raged against the sin of adultery, and ended by declaiming censoriously that the woman in the story was a sinner, and that Jesus told her to sin no more adding "And you should all remember that!"...

All I can say is: "Hey, pal, you're missing the point a bit: long before Jesus addresses the poor defenceless woman on her behaviour, He confronts her cowardly accusers with their own failings."

To those who today try and accuse, condemn, and bully, Jesus says much the same thing as to the men in the story: "Look at your own lives, and don't accuse, condemn, or bully the defenceless".

As the Evangelist St John writes" "For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him."

St Fillan's Church announced new annual travel and subsistence awards to young persons in the village in the Spring edition of the Crosier. It is intended that these awards will be made to help successful applicants with travel and/or living expenses while taking part in a placement with a recognised/registered charity in support of voluntary (or similar) work during travel away from home.

We had one applicant this year, and a travel support award of £300 was made to Daisy Winskill in August. Daisy travelled to India in September to work with the *Project Trust Charity* in Tamil Nadu in Southern India, where she will be teaching English for a year. We wish her well, and hope she enjoys her experience.

#### World Mission Stamp Appeal 2019

Last year the Church of Scotland's World Mission Stamp Appeal raised £2433 for the Hungarian Reformed Church of Transcarpathia. Thank you for all the stamps you have contributed to this magnificent amount.

This year the Stamp Appeal is supporting the Chigodi Women Centre in Blantyre, Malawi. This centre aims to provide training in tailoring, fashion design and chicken farming thus improving the women's skills in marketing and entrepreneurship. The aim is that as the women's socio-economic status is improved their chances of future employment increase.

#### **Open Door**

#### Programme of speakers 2019 – 20

14<sup>th</sup>NOVEMBER. 'The Lewis Chessmen' David Caldwell spent 38 years working for the National Museum in Edinburgh. As a curator he had responsibility for the Lewis chessmen, arguably the most valuable treasure in Scotland. David's interests have been focussed on the archaeology of the Highlands and Islands and he has co-authored two books on the Lewis chessmen. He is President of the Society of Antiquaries, Chair of Fife Cultural Trust and a board member of the National Trust for Scotland.

12<sup>th</sup>DECEMBER. "Scottish Oddities" speaker Hamish Brown M.B.E. FRSGS, as a child he lived in <u>Singapore</u>, escaping in 1942 as it fell to the Japanese. Hamish spent his youth in Dollar exploring the nearby <u>Ochil Hills</u> which awakened his interest in the outdoors. He is a professional writer, lecturer and photographer specialising in mountain topics. Best known for his walking exploits in the Highlands, Hamish is the first person to walk all the Munros in a single trip with only ferries and a bicycle as means of transport.

16<sup>th</sup>JANUARY. "The Town That Didn't Stare". The Life and Work of Dr Archibald McIndoe in the Second World War. Chris Short a former nurse/midwife who has lived 30 years in Aberdour discusses the work of Dr Archibald McIndoe, a surgeon with Scottish ancestry who performed pioneering plastic surgery on badly burnt RAF crew during WW2. This talk commemorates the 80th anniversary of the Battle of Britain, July - October 1940, from which came so many of his patients.

13<sup>th</sup>FEBRUARY 'A Safari to Botswana and Zimbabwe featuring Wildlife, Culture & a bit of **Politics'.** Lesley Gordon has been a long-term resident of Aberdour and was, until recently, a teacher of Biology at Inverkeithing High School. Her father was born in South Africa where she was taken as a girl to live. The smells and sounds of Africa are deeply ingrained in her, such that she has revisited Africa, on several occasions. Her last excursion was to Botswana & Zimbabwe in the autumn of 2018.

12<sup>th</sup>MARCH. "Cowden Japanese Garden" Kate White, Head Gardener at Cowden Japanese Garden, studied crop and soil science at University of Wales, Bangor, and started out working in large scale organic agriculture on the Moray Coast. She retrained at Royal Botanic Garden Edinburgh, (RBGE). Since then, she has worked in historic and botanic gardens at Dunedin Botanic Garden (New Zealand), Cruickshank Botanic Garden (Aberdeen) and NTS Leith Hall (Huntly), before gaining a permanent post in the Rock & Woodland Garden team at RBGE. She took up her present post in 2016.
