The Manse Aberdour

Dear Friends,

How the years pass! It is over 20 years ago since we Scotts came to Aberdour, though it seems like only yesterday. By contrast it seems as though we have spent all our lives here, so much have we felt at home. These have been very happy years for us and now the time has come to move on - into retirement on 30th June. We shall be moving to a new home, provided by the Church of Scotland for our use, in the St. David's area of Dalgety Bay (32 White's Quay), and I must confess to feeling quite excited at the prospect - as well as sad at leaving Aberdour. One of the problems with which we are faced is trying to fit a quart into a pint pot! How do you squeeze the contents of a 12-large-roomed house into a modern 5-apartment house with little storeage space? You can't - so the clear-out has started. The trouble is that I am a natural hoarder, and clearing out a drawer becomes a walk down memory lane as every item is carefully examined and every scrap of paper read. Fortunately Cath is more sensible. Happy days! My hope and prayer is that the days ahead will be just as happy.

I am tempted to devote this entire letter to looking back

over the years I have been privileged to be your parish minister, but it's not good to dwell on the past alone. What about the future? The vacancy procedure will start at the Presbytery meeting on 7th March when my demission will be dealt with and Presbytery will appoint an Interim Moderator, a minister who will work with me until I retire and thereafter will take charge until the new minister arrives, which could be as soon as October. A Vacancy Committee will be formed, and it will be their task to find my successor. The work and witness of a church does not depend on the minister but on the folk in the

pews, and I am confident that will continue during the vacancy.

One item that will be going with us to our new home is an old framed motto that belonged to my grandparents: "Let us remember! We cannot always fail in life any more than we can always succeed!" Imagine how dreary life would be if we always succeeded in everything we did - no challenge to meet, no excitement, nothing to work for; it would be even worse if we failed in everything we did. As we approach the season of Easter we are reminded again of the apparent failure of Jesus, when all seemed to end on Calvary. But God turned that into a resounding victory by the Resurrection as the last enemy, death, was conquered. At the crucial moment Jesus was let down by his disciples when they ran away and left him on his own. But God turned that failure also into success, they were forgiven and went out in the name of their risen Lord to set the world alight - it has never been the same since.

THE LATE DAWSON MACFARLANE


Usually I confine pulpit tributes only to members of the Kirk Session but I feel that the following is well justified; it was given on Sunday 18th February:

Dawson McFarlane, who died on Friday after a long illness, was never an elder in this congregation which he joined in 1949,

but he served it so well and so diligently that I cannot let the occasion pass without making mention of the work he did. Dawson was appointed Clerk to the Congregational Board in 1950 and in 1955 Congregational Treasurer, holding both posts for a year until a new Clerk was appointed. For 36 years then he served as Treasurer, receiving a long-service certificate from the Church of Scotland and gifts from the congregation in recognition of that service. He was meticulous in his keeping of the books, using the system which he had learned as a chartered accountant, which involved hand-written accounts, a very time-consuming task. But it was something he delighted in and you could seldom call on him of an evening without finding the church's account book sitting beside him. Dawson was not just however the congregational treasurer but also a faithful member of the Church, seldom missing a service here in St. Fillan's. Weekly worship was an essential part of his life and he particularly enjoyed the hymns and hymn-singing. He was the only person I know who listened every week to the Sunday Halfhour, the praise service on radio every Sunday evening. Any words of mine must be inadequate to describe not just Dawson's devoted service but the debt of gratitude that we as a congregation owe to him and folk like him for what they have done for us and for Him whom we seek to serve.
