Sunday School

The Sunday School year is well under way. We started the year with no pianist but now we have two - Eric Williamson and Alice Hall - so we can have music every week and what a difference it makes.

Every year, after the celebration of harvest, we concentrate our thoughts on the Nativity Play and, as time is short in Sunday School, this takes several weeks. This year the Nativity Play was held on Sunday 22nd December in the Church and the children brought alive once again the Spirit of Christmas.

The day before our Christmas Service we had our Christmas party in the Church Hall. In recent years we have reverted to a traditional party with well known games and a few new ones for added interest! The food is provided by the teachers and for a number of years now crackers have been provided by a member of the congregation. Santa is welcomed at the end of the party and all the children receive gifts from him.

Each week in Sunday School we worship, play and learn. We want the children to learn about Christianity but we also want them to experience the joy of Christian fellowship. As part of our worship we have an offering each Sunday and at the end of each year the proceeds are sent to various charities. This year Scripture Union, Save the Children, YMCA(for homeless youngsters) and the Nazareth Hospital each received £100.

We were delighted when our new minister visited us at the restart of Sunday School after our Christmas break. We are always pleased to have adult visitors and from time to time John Anderson and Ronnie Kerr visit us and are always made welcome. If any adults would like to come along and join in we would be delighted to welcome them.

At present we have approximately 40 children attending Sunday School; children between 3 and 12 can join us at any time during the Sunday School year and it is always especially good when some who have been away for a while return to us.

Easy and spontaneous as when I wag my tail,


May he be as readily grateful as I am quick to lick his hand.


goes with the good.

I NEVER REALISED THERE WAS SO MUCH IN IT

Having been an Ordained Elder for only a few months and the only one from Aberdour to have attended a Residential Training Course at St Ninian's Centre in Crieff, I felt that it may be appropriate to attempt to share some of the feelings and ideas which I came home with.

It was a strange weekend in that I drove up slowly and with some trepidation about the people I would be meeting and whether the training would conflict with my own beliefs and feelings. The weather was lovely, a beautiful late autumn day with pale sun and sharp frost silvering the fields. I arrived at Crieff too early for the course and had time to wander about the town. It was the first time I had been in Crieff and I was a pleased to wander around a traditional country town with small individual shops on both sides of the street and no chain stores.

On booking in at the Centre I was surprised to meet the Reverend Peter Neilson the Director of Training, who grew up in the next village to where I come from and we shared an enjoyable half hour reminiscing on people we had known before sitting down to a meal and meeting the others on the course. After the introductions, experience sharing and discussing why we had come, we went to Evening Prayers and social gathering until bedtime.

During the meal I was surprised to find that I was the only 'new' Elder on the New Elder Training Weekend, the others being two experienced elders from Dumfries, (with over 20 years service each), another two from Appin, one of whom had been Session Clerk for 12 years and the other three from Lhanbryde, who were thinking about becoming elders, the unusual aspect of this was that there are normally 50 on a course and we were only 8. /

/ The accommodation was modern and comfortable with the meals prepared by staff and served on a work share basis.

The course consisted of Six Sessions as follows:

- Being An Elder Today (Biblical roots, discussion of the application for today)
- Being a Leader Today (Qualities of Leadership, Team Leadership, Discovering our g ifts)
- 3 Being a Pastor Today (Guidelines on pastoral care)
- 4 Being a Witness Today (Case studies)
- 5 Being a Disciple Today (Reflecting alone and together on Jesus' word to us)
- 6 Being an Elder Tomorrow (Identify lessons and benefits. A 'take-away' strategy)

Despite having to extract myself from the Centre to attend the Vacancy Committee party on the Saturday night I felt that it was all worth while and hope that you find that it was too.
