#### Dear friends and members,

Curling, luge or snowboarding? I was dozing in my armchair watching the winter Olympics, dreaming I had been chosen to participate in one of these three. Snowboarding was unlikely. I cannot remain upright on two skis, what chance on a single plank? The luge perhaps? Pleasant childhood memories of sledging on kitchen trays mingled with the fearful prospect of careering feet first down sheet ice at 130 kph. Curling seemed a good choice, after all I already play, and could visualise myself playing the winning shot for the gold medal. Then I woke up! My flu induced hallucinatory dream giving way to a TV report telling the fascinating story of Chris Moon, the athlete who carried the Olympic flame into the stadium at the opening ceremony.

Some years ago he became concerned at the plight of people living in war ravaged countries sown with land mines. The "locals" found themselves in a situation not of their doing or choice, selves and/or loved ones being indiscriminately killed or maimed and unable to escape from the horrors. Chris believed someone should help, and offered himself as a volunteer to clear mines. He fell victim to an explosion, losing a leg and part of an arm. Fitted with an artificial limb, he continued helping by running marathons to raise funds ... and recognition of his efforts resulted in him carrying the torch. My dream of Olympian glory was replaced by the humbling reality of someone focusing on helping others in a meaningful tangible way.

Chris's story was refreshing and encouraging. We hear so much of a western society leaning towards the self-centred and it is good to be told of people caring for and helping others, especially when this good news is broadcast to a nation wide, if not world wide, audience. We cannot all be like Chris and take a stance over the issue of land mines, but we can still demonstrate our concern for others in a meaningful way. I can think of and give thanks for the many in our parish and congregation who uphold traditional values, who wear their Christian faith on their sleeves and follow Christ's example and instruction to help others in a practical and self-giving way. Christ encourages those of who have God given gifts, skills and money to share our talents with those who have little or nothing and it is good to know that many follow the Master's command. I pray that those who demonstrate a practical sharing faith be given the strength to continue and encourage those who are hesitant in working out their practical Christianity to seek ways of doing so.

To all of you who have handed in stamps recently, I would like to say "Thank You", and for those who wish to know what happens to them read on.

When I have a very large "poly" bag, full I take it over to 121 George Street where the stamps are gathered, sorted and sold to collectors. Administration costs are negligible as the skilled work of preparing and selling is done by volunteers. The overall success of the stamp centre depends on the support given to it by congregations, organisations and individuals throughout Scotland and further afield.

All used stamps from Britain and overseas have value but I would ask you not to remove stamps from the backing paper in case the stamp is damaged and it loses its value. When cutting a stamp from an envelope do leave about a quarter of an inch of paper all round as this would be a great help.

The money raised through the stamp sales goes towards helping overseas mission work and you may be interested to know that the 1995 total was  $\pounds 2569.95$  and 1996  $\pounds 3366.05$

# Tales of the Kirk Session - The Farmer.


#### 13th July 1804.....

".....several members of the Session in going and returning from the church on Thursday the fifth day of July current, saw several ploughs at work on the farm of Croftgarie in a field, within view of the church, presently farmed by John Inglis and that whereas the Session have been credibly informed that the farm servants of William Inglis of Templehill, father of the said John Inglis, and, also those of Mr Young, tenant of South Balmould, were engaged with their horses on their respective farms on the said fifth day of July being the Fast Day. The Session considering themselves bound in duty not to allow this outrage on the decency and good order hitherto observed by all the inhabitants within the bounds of the Parish to pass unnoticed, and also, with the view of having this cause of offence removed in the future, unanimously agreed after ascertaining the particular circumstances in the cases before mentioned that Mr Bryce their moderator lay the whole before the Sheriff of Fife that he may do therein as the law decides."

#### 28th June 1805

"....Mr Bryce also produced a letter from the Sheriff of Fife in answer to the one he had written to him at the desire of the Session regarding Mr William Inglis and his son ploughing and harrowing on the Fast Day preceding the dispensing of the Sacrament in the Parish. The Session agreed according to the opinion of the Sheriff that the minister should inform them "That their offence has not passed unnoticed and that a repetition of it will most assuredly occasion the interference of the civil power."

(It is with interest that the editor read this item because, as a seventeen year old, he had the audacity to question the tennis club chairman (Capt. Hughes) on why the courts could not be used on a Sunday morning. The answer was "In deference to those going to and returning from morning worship, play will not be permitted till after lunch.")



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#### Sierra Leone

I am not sure how it happened but one was added to our family. This particular "one" was a wee boy of four and living in a village in Sierra Leone. My daughter, Gabrielle, having heard that it is possible to sponsor a child for  $\pounds 15$  a month in some of the worlds less savoury places had opened this option and had become a part of the Christian Children's Fund (CCF). This is Gabrielle's story of Wusman Sesay.

The first letters I received from the CCF Sierra Leone project were written on Wusman's behalf by the project officer, who was a local man, and they contained much information about the family and soon I felt I was becoming part of that family by understanding the problems they had just to live in a country beset by political upsets, never mind trying to grow crops without decent means. Wusman's father is a crop farmer and young Wusman was the scarecrow. All day long he would run over the field shouting at the birds. I thought this was funny when I read about it but on reflection it is a serious matter when it means the difference between eating and not eating. For Wusman's sixth birthday I sent an extra sum of money and was amazed to learn that "my" wee boy had been able to get his first shoes. Since he was walking six miles to school each day this would be a real bonus for him. It was at this point that I realised that these people have nothing and if it was not for CCF they would not even have medical facilities or the chance of an education. Meanwhile the government were having their own problems with breakaway factions that were driving the country into turmoil. Wusman's village was in a firing line and evacuation was talked of.

In a letter to Wusman I described a kite and was rewarded in my next letter from Wusman himself that the class had built one with the help of the teacher and had had fun flying it. You have no idea the pleasure I got from that first letter in his own hand describing part of his growing up. On another occasion I sent him a packet of balloons and he had become the centre of attraction as no one had seen balloons before.

At the time when Wusman was 10, the rebels in Sierra Leone got out of hand and were known to be causing trouble in communities and schools, so Wusman's village was evacuated to Freetown for safety. Unfortunately law and order broke down. The banks were looted and had to shut. The government collapsed and it was everyone for himself. At this point I received a letter from CCF asking not to send letters as they (CCF) could no longer operate and there was no postal service anyway, but wait further news. Wusman, his two younger brothers and sister and other family members and villagers were trying to cross the border to the Red Cross camp.

For six months I waited for news and finally it came. Rebels had come across the group, selected some of the children and shot them. Wusman was one.

Wusman's life had been short but I know that through sponsorship and contact by letters his quality of life had been made a little better. It is my resolve to continue.

Captain William Morgan - The Sea Saga Continues......



Michael Dun, the historian for the Maritime Fife Project at the Scottish Institute of Maritime Studies, St Andrews, has established further fascinating information on Capt. William Morgan, who left his silver gilt cup to St. Fillan's.

In the eighteenth century it was the practice in maritime warfare to issue "letters of marque" to private individuals licensing them to operate against enemy shipping. Known as privateers these vessels lived by what they could capture. and providing they possessed a letter of marque, if captured themselves, they could not be treated as pirates.

Issued on the 19th December 1796 "A business of granting a letter of Marque" to William Morgan, Commander of the private Ship of War called the Jane to take the ships, vessels, and goods belonging to France, or to any persons being subject to France, or inhabiting within the territories of France .......William Morgan and others who submit themselves to the jurisdiction to the high court of Admiralty of England, obliged themselves unto our sovereign lord the king in the sum of £1500 of lawful money is duly authorised by letters of Marque and reprizals(sic) with the ship called the Jane of the burthen of about 159 tons whereof he, the said William Morgan, goeth matter by force of arms to attack, surprise seize and take all ships and vessels, goods, and merchandise, chattels and effects, belonging to France.....Accepting only within the harbours or roads, within shot of the cannon, of Princes and States in Amity with his Majesty.

In a further declaration to the high court of the Admiralty dated December 1796, That the said William Morgans ship, is called the Jane, is belonging to the Port of Jamaica, is of the burthan of 159 tons, is plantation built square rigged, has three masts, that the said Wm. Morgan doeth Commander of her, that she is mounted with 16 carriage guns, carrying shot of 6 & 4 pounds weight....with 80 men of whom one third are landsmen, has 40 small arms, 40 cut laces, 40 barrels of powder, 20 rounds of great shot, and is victualled for 4 months, has two suits of sails, 4 weight of spare cordage. That TH Jones goes as mate or Lieutenant, John Smith gunner, Wm. Stow Boatswain, John Cook Carpenter, Ian Roberts Cook and ----(none) Surgeon of the said ship and that Alexander Donaldson (who gave the cup to William Morgan), Alex Forbes and Wm. Morgan, all of Jamaica, Owner and setter out of the said ship.

# PLEASE REVIEW YOUR SUPPORT FOR THE CHURCH

This year, to meet our planned budget the congregation of StFillan's need to raise £55,055. This figure reflects a number of significant increases, some decided by the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, others resulting from increased activity within our congregation. Our allocation to the central funds of the Church of Scotland has been increased by over £1,500, largely to finance an increase in the Service Supplement Fund This supports the Ministry in Aid Receiving Parishes. We have to provide an additional £600 to meet the costs of our excellent new arrangements for having the children in church every Sunday. Finally the Congregational Board has decided to place the maintenance of our fabric on a sounder basis This involves the setting up of a Fabric Maintenance Account, together with the discipline of allocating £3,000 a year from our General Fund to that account To meet this increased expenditure we have made savings in other areas, but we still need an increase in giving by all of us of 3%. Individually this may not mean a significant increase, but it does require us all to review not only how much we give, but also our method of giving.


In 1997 our Deeds of Covenant and donations by Weekly Freewill Offering were broadly as expected There was a most welcome increase in offerings to the Open Collection. Here, I would ask those of you who give your support through the Open Collection and pay Income Tax to seriously consider making a Deed of Covenant It will cost you no more and we will be able to reclaim the tax. In 1997 we reclaimed £7,449; 15% of our total income. We need to increase this sum.

For those of you who already support St Fillan's through a Deed of Covenant or by WFO I would ask you to review your giving and see if you can manage the 3% increase that we need to achieve.

As a guide to giving, the table below shows the spread of donations by our present Deeds of Covenant:

# Choir News: "What a Stramash"

When I was appointed Church Organist I looked at ways of improving the musical side of the worship, and as you are aware was given approval for the resiting of the organ consul, which gives a greater viewing control to the organist in regard to the ongoing activities during the Service. I also had a look at the Choir placement and obtained the ministers agreement to move the Choir to the front of the Church for an experimental period of two weeks. My reason for this was as follows:

a) To consider the effect on the Congregational singing, (we are after all going through a phase of not sticking entirely to the Church Hymnary CH3, but adding new Hymns from Songs of Gods People, Mission Praise etc.,) and it appeared to me that the front of the Church, and to some extent the rear of the Church, were not benefiting from the Choir lead.


b) My second consideration was that the Choir should be seen and heard by the whole congregation, also this could aid the possible recruitment to the loyal eight members of the choir, who could now see and participate more in the Church Service.

Deep Breath! That was until a request was made from the pulpit for the Congregation to inform me of their feelings on the resiting experiment. To date I have had at least twenty five or more phone calls, four

To date I have had at least twenty five or more phone calls, four confrontations, and three letters. (I hope my wife will soon resume the making of my meals!) All of which have requested me to return the Choir to the Organ Gallery, and not one request for the choir to stay at the front. The result of this 'survey' has been passed to the minister.

One thing bothers me though, the 'silent majority'.

I would like to thank, however, all who got in touch with me, it was pleasant to speak to and hear from St. Fillans folk who were previously

The experiment completed the choir has now returned to their original perch in the organ loft but on certain occasions will be seen to flutter down to the front of the church.



# **CROSSROADS CHARITY SHOP**

CROSSROADS was set up in Dunfermline in 1981 to provide home-based respite care for carers of the elderly, the chronic sick or terminally ill, and the physically and mentally disabled of all ages. Crossroads currently helps 120 cares around Dunfermline,



providing about 550 hours of care per month. However there is a lengthy waiting list because funding cutbacks by the main supporters - Fife Council and Health Board mean that resources are no longer adequate to meet the needs of the growing number of carers in the community. One way the churches of Aberdour can help provide

Gardener. Not a gardener. Can cut grass. Can't cut grass.


Whatever you can or can't do we would like to hear from you. The Flower Show could run itself but we tend to have four
