Dear friends and members,

What does the parish minister do?

If you posed that question about my ministry I suspect you would evoke a wide and varied range of responses depending on individual perception. Some might say "not a lot! - other than an hour on Sundays;" or "I don't know - but he's never in when I want him". Others might cite specific examples such as "he takes Bible Studies" or "he does weddings and funerals". You might even hear mention of delivering lengthy sermons! or particular pastoral situations in which I have been involved. Differing perspectives of the one ministry.

If the question were put to me I would have difficulty in providing a concise reply because ministers do not have a definitive job description and our duties are very much influenced and directed by the needs of the community. However, a central plank to the concept of parish ministry in the Church of Scotland, is the call of a minister by God to serve the people of God in a specific place at a particular time. This calling to minister to God's people permeates our life and activities at both congregational and parish level. For example; in becoming minister to St Fillan's I was ordained by our local Presbytery and authorised to "minister the Word and Sacraments and bear rule in the flock of God". This charge carries with it a wonderful opportunity and awesome responsibility to nurture and develop those who want to be associated with St Fillan's . To encourage and foster this Christian growth I am involved in leading worship,

Bible studies, prayer groups and such like and if you would like to join with us in these activities you will be made most welcome.

Alongside this congregational activity, and equally important to our calling, is a wider responsibility to the entire parish. This comes about because the Church of Scotland, as the National Church, is charged with "bringing the ordinances of religion" to the people of Scotland. This means that I am available to everyone within the parish and congregation who wants to be associated with the Christian faith and wants to know more about matters of religion such as Church membership, baptisms, marriages, funerals, and such like.

I know that many who read this will be part of another or such of the Christian Church and will have their own Christian minister. Others will have other religious beliefs, or may be atheists, and do not require the services of a Christian minister. If however you do not have an active church connection elsewhere and want to speak to me about religious matters please feel free to contact me. Unlike the corner shop in Ronnie Barker's TV comedy I can't guarantee being "open all hours" but will certainly make arrangements to see anyone and everyone who wishes to see me.

Influence of the Church in Burns Time

When Burns was alive Scotland was a very religious country. Most lowland Scots were Protestants who attended the Church of Scotland regularly. Infact, in some places people were fined if they did not attend all three church services on Sunday. People were also expected to hold religious services in their houses every day.

Pupils in school were taught to read the bible. They were also tought the Catechism, which was a long list of questions and answers about the belief of the Church of Scotland. Every one was expected to know the answers to these questions by heart. Ministers used to visit peoples houses to make sure that everyone knew the Catechism and to explain its meaning.

Ministers were helped in these duties by elders who were religious men elected by church goers to help them. Each elder regularly visited a group of families to discuss the Catechism and the ministers sermon. The elders also kept an eye on people. They made sure they attended church regularly and that they lived religious lives and did not break any of the ten commandments. They were particularly keen to find out why people missed church services and to catch anyone who worked on Sundays.

The church, at that time, was very strict, but there were arguments as to how strict it should be. One group called the "Auld Lights" was much stricter than the "New Lights" and there were terrible arguments between the two groups. The Auld Lights for example, did not approve of dancing and dance music and they wanted people to sing only religious music. Robert Burns was aware of these arguments and although he liked some people who were Auld Lights,

he usually supported the New Lights. He had especial dislike for people who claimed to be very religious but who, infact, were not as good as they said. Burns maintained that these people were hypocrites, and in doing so got himself into considerable trouble, and more than once had to appear before the minister and session for a rebuke. The session clerk of Mauchline Church, came in for particular attention, with his devastating "Holy Willie's Prayer".

"Yet I am here a chosen sample,
To show thy Grace is great and ample,
I am here a pillar in thy temple,
Strong as a rock,
A guide, a buckler, an example
To a' thy flock.
O Lord, thou kens what zeal I bear,
When drinkers drink, and swearer's swear,
And singin' there and dancin' here,
Wi' reat an' sma',
For I am keepit by thy fear free frae them a'".

Burns of course had the gift of using words in an amusing way and the ladies were usually very pleased with their poems. On one Sunday as he sat beside a lady while the minister preached a frightening sermon about how God punished wicked people, he took her bible and wrote this verse on it:

Fair maid, you need not take the hint Nor idle texts pursue: Twas guilty sinners that he meant, Not Angels such as you.

It was a time of great "devides" for the mass of the population particularly in Burns country, Ayrshire, and most of the churches had a gallery for the local gentry. I recollect some of the churches I played the organ in, still referred to "The Sundrum Gallery", "The Dalrymple Gallery", "The Ballochmyle Gallery" etc. and are rarely used by the congregations to this day. They even, in some cases, had separate outside staircases in order not to mix with the masses.

Distances from the churches must have been a chore for the congregation with the thought of walking twice or three times a day (and not forgetting the ministers tonsils).

Scotland was changing during Burns lifetime, new ideas about religion and using the English language in every day life became important. His opinion on how it was changing is well reflected in his writings of the events in his time. English translations of the bible were used in most lowland Scottish homes and churches. The most famous one was the King James authorised version, 1611. In Scotland the Scots learned to write english as a foreign language and gradually important Scots began to speak English instead of Scots or Gaelic.

All in all it is generally agreed that Burns took his religion seriously along with the Scottish population at this time and proved it with his "epistle" to a young friend:

But when one life we're tempest-driv'n, A conscience but a canker, A correspondence fix'd wi' heav'n Is sure a noble anchor



And now I have 'stepped into the ring' to replace Linda, and would like to take this opportunity of thanking both Carleen and Linda for their hard-working commitment in keeping this tradition going.

ALPHA COURSE

The Hype - It all started with a brightly coloured leaflet which dropped through the letterbox, 'Alpha is coming soon'. There wasn't all that much other information, just the name of a local co-ordinator, someone else in the village I didn't know, and who wasn't a recognisable Christian, at least from my own church year book. All a bit suspicious, is this another one of those foreign cult things like The Moonies?

The Crack of Dawn - One Sunday in church the Minister mentioned that the Alpha Course would be starting soon and would those interested in finding out more details come along to a meeting and decide if they would like to become group leaders and get some more information about Alpha, seems a bit less suspect if the Minister is involved but still not too sure of what it is about and how much of a commitment will be required from me.

Stage Two - Went along to the meeting and prayers for Alpha, seemed to be all right, I knew most of the people there, many of them were from my own church and the rest from other known Christian groups in the village, with one or two strangers. A round of prayers for Alpha and for all of us participating asking for guidance and support, followed by introductions and the course handbooks were handed round for reading and study at home.

Going Well - No trapdoors so far - First night, still a bit nervous but lots of friends around me, known group leaders, our church hall and the Minister leading us through the course, what can possibly be wrong with this? Started off with tea/coffee, delectable treats of home baking and an easy relaxed chat before setting off on our voyage of discovery with a prayer and into the first video presentation by Nicky Gumbel.

Glimmers - What a dynamic personality, such enthusiasm and he was speaking from a packed church and using the Bible to quote examples from. Spilt up into our own smaller groups and discussed our feelings and reactions to the presentation, using our own experiences and

sharing them. Not one hundred percent comfortable about opening up my inner feelings yet, even although I know most of the people, there are still doubts about the 'hidden' meanings of Alpha.

Down to the business - Second week, almost the same as the first but settling down with the other course members and developing with the group. Week three I was in Northern Ireland and must have been guided towards the only Alpha Course within a one hundred mile radius of where I was staying, it was in the village and a warm welcome was extended by those participants, all sharing the same doubts and feelings, but willing to continue our life explorations. Back home and the weeks fly by, having passed the point where I felt that I couldn't stand any more of Nicky Gumbel talking 'at' me continually for 40 minutes every evening until I really began to listen to the messages and not the presentation. This had the effect of making me think more of my 'Christianity' and how little I practice what is preached.

The Light - The course ended with me feeling unsatisfied, hungry and wanting more with a great yearning to learn more, practice more, share more, care more spread the messages and become a better person. Alpha goes on to advanced courses and I hope that I am able to carry on and grow with it.



Rudsambee is an Edinburgh based choir and the name "Rudsambee" comes from the Gaelic expression 'rud sam bith' meaning 'anything at all'. The repertoire includes a large number of Scottish and Gaene songs as well as music from Medieval Europe, The Balkans, South and West Africa, North America, The Middle East, Asia, The Caucasus, and Scandinavia. The choir has written their own arrangements for most of the traditional tunes they sing.

Rudsambee has produced their first CD with a second due this year, have broadcast several times on BBC Radio

Scotland and were classed "Outstanding" in the 1998 Edinburgh Competition Festival when they won the adult choirs section. For the Aberdour concert Rudsambee has invited Kobenhauns Folkekor to join them in what will be another memorable occasion in St Fillan's.

RATTs - (Round Aberdour Tummy Trimmers)

Lawrence Leask has organised a small group of, sometimes less than enthusiastic joggers, who have been running round Aberdour in the dark, scaring old people and dogs, unintentionally of course. The idea was to jog of turkey and Christmas puddings by meetings at the village clock on Sundays, Wednesdays and Fridays at 8.00pm and setting off on runs, based on the pace and ability of the slowest person. So far about 15 people have joined in, not all at the same time. The youngest, below 10 and the oldest over 50, if you fit in or want to expand the parameters just meet us at the clock. Targets are not set but you can make your own aims, some are going for the Dorkey Brae Run and others for the Dunfermline to Edinburgh Marathon, some just running for fun. Come on.

Garden of Remembrance

Aberdour Community Council is pleased to say that Fife Council have agreed to consider providing a Garden of Remembrance within the village cemetery. The proposed setting and layout will provide a very suitable and tranquil setting within the village for those who would like the opportunity to purchase a memorial plaque to commemorate their departed loved ones. The Garden will enhance the existing cemetery and those who prefer to purchase lairs and/or headstones will still be able to do so in the future.

The Council will provide one, or more, planters near the existing white shelter. Each planter will have 48 small memorial plaques (approximate size 9" x 3") each of which will be engraved with an appropriate message chosen by individual subscribers. We still await final details but the estimated cost of plaques will be £150/£200 (depending on amount of engraving), this cost equates favourably with similar Gardens of Remembrance at Dunfermline and Kirkcaldy.

Fife Council has agreed to proceed once we can demonstrate sufficient interest for this Garden and our own Community Council is collating requests from the village. We hope to proceed once we have say 24 requests for plaques and anyone interested in purchasing a plaque should speak with Peter Park, parish minister, or Bunny Gray, CC chairman, in the first instance.

Anyone can purchase a plaque and we ask that everyone makes the availability of this new village amenity as widely known as possible.

"Share prayer"

First Sunday monthly after morning worship - starting 2nd May 1999.
