

Bible Class and the Chernobyl Children's Life Line Appeal

As many of you will remember, the Chernobyl nuclear accident happened in 1986. It was devastating at the time and its effects are still being felt today. Many families suffer dreadful illnesses and many die far too young.

The Chernobyl Children Life Line began in a small way with the idea that groups of children from the area, particularly Belarus, could be brought to Britain for a month's holiday. This appeal has grown and now there are groups all over Britain, including one in the Dunfermline area, arranging these holidays. It is estimated that a month staying with a family eating nourishing food and breathing clean air can add up to two years to these children's life expectancy.

St Fillan's Bible Class decided to help this appeal. The congregation helped us by collecting 2ps and in just a few weeks we have over £100 which will help to purchase items, such as vitamins, for the children.

We should like to continue helping this appeal when we return to Bible Class in September so we would ask you to keep saving your 2ps for us. Thank you. 

FROM: JIM FAIRLIE, CHURCH ORGANIST.

I often visit St George's Church of Scotland in Shandwick Place, Edinburgh.

Apart from being a place of worship it has a lively snack bar for lunches (worth a visit). It is usually quite busy with all types and quite a number go for a walk round the church after their meal, enjoying the quietness from the hustle and bustle of big city noise, and a break from the work place.

St George's is a large Victorian type Presbyterian Church with a large domed ceiling, and is dominated at the far end with big organ pipes. On a recent visit the organist started playing and it was interesting to see many diners, curiosity aroused, leave their meals for a quick look-see. So what attracted their attention was it the music or was it just curiosity? How often do we turn our heads at the first skirl of the pipes, or stop in our tracks at a street busker?

The Church has altered its traditional pew seating. Instead of row upon row facing the pulpit they have reduced the seating and placed the pews at three angles all facing a large central area with a lectern stand, thus bringing the preacher into the body of the Kirk.

St George's concentrates its singing on Common Ground Hymn book (one of those we use in St Fillan's). Common Ground has many modern, interesting and singable hymns with lots of old and new British tunes supplemented with hymns from other countries such as Africa and New Zealand.

On the subject of singing has it been noticed that we are now without a choir, and therefore without a lead for the new hymns that are becoming more popular Although latterly I was only asking for about an hour's practice before worship to rehearse the service hymns the choir was not being adequately supported therefore I decided to suspend it. I am aware there are a number of good singers in the Church and I hope to restart the choir in the future if I am given encouragement with some new members. I'll have more to say about this in the Autumn but in the meantime if anyone wants to speak with me about the choir please do so,

I'll leave you with something to ponder on given to me by a church member, "why does the congregation not clap the church organist when he plays a particularly pleasing piece of music but gives enthusiastic clapping for our bell ringers?"

No more unauthorised walkabouts!

To find out that your child is missing, even momentarily, is a sickening feeling.

My daughter, Kirsty who is 2 "escaped" from the Church Hall a few Wednesdays ago while at the Baby and Toddler Group and wandered out onto the High Street with another toddler. Thankfully they were spotted and picked up by Lesley Bowie and Elaine Nicoll outside the Newsagents just as we realised they were missing from the hall. I don't even like to think about what might have happened to them during those few moments that they were missing but it was immediately obvious that we had had a very lucky escape and needed to improve security at the hall urgently.

We have used the Church Hall for Toddlers for the last few years and have always relied upon the weight of the two heavy fire doors at the entrance to contain the children - as the two children who got out were by no means the biggest or strongest it was obvious that the doors could be opened by many of the children if they so wished.

Bruce Drever, the Church Hall convener and I discussed several security options - installing an alarm on the inner door, raising the handle so that it could not be reached by the children etc. The problem was to find a solution which would keep smaller children secure whilst allowing free access to others. A Fire Officer came along to advise us on regulations. Bruce then decided to phone around to try to get some advice and tried Base Securities in the High Street - they first offered to call round and advise and then later phoned to offer us a security system free of charge!

The offer was made by Mr Blair Auld, the Managing Director - the system which he offered and which has now been fitted is similar to that used in shops. A loop device has been fitted around the door of the hall together with an alarm - each child will wear a tag and should they go out of the door the alarm will sound to alert us. We have now started using the system for the Toddler Group and "Mucky Pups" (preschool Arts and Crafts Group)

We would like to take this opportunity to thank Mr Auld and Base Securities Ltd for his generous gift to the community which should help ensure the safety of children using the hall for years to come. Fiona McDonald





A special day by Gladys Hunter

Recollections of a day conference

The Rev Peter Park, our minister at St Fillan's Church Aberdour, first made mention on our Sunday service programme, of an event to take place on Saturday 27th April 2002 to which four of our congregation were invited to attend. This was to be a meeting in Perth concerning 'Church without Walls' which had been spoken of at the General Assembly in Edinburgh.

When leaving the church after that service, I said to Peter that I would like to go if he was willing to consider me to be one of the four. He said he would think about it, and it was left at that. Several weeks passed and nothing was said on either side. I came to the conclusion that the four must have been decided on, therefore you can imagine the delightful surprise I received when our Session Clerk, Catherine Duncan, handed me a slip of paper saying that on Saturday 27th April at 8.30am I would be picked up and conveyed to the Perth Salutation Hotel for the 'Church without Walls' gathering! I found I would be in the illustrious company of Catherine, Mr Bill Chalmers and Mr Ewart McSkimming. I felt indeed honoured that I had been granted this favour. I wondered to myself if they got a shock when told that the 92 year old hag, Gladys Hunter, was to accompany them, as they may have preferred a younger glamour-puss! It was not to be - Peter had remembered my request ... I was to go, which I could hardly believe.

Actually, I was curious to know what was meant by 'Church without Walls', as, following the General Assembly, I had read a rather disturbing article in the Daily Mail newspaper, which conjured up visions of the church as we know it, no more, far removed from what we have been used to. However, to my joy, what was said in the paper was unfounded, as it is actually a way of coming nearer to God and Jesus, if by new routes we are willing to follow.

I was so wound up and enthusiastic regarding the 'Church without Walls' as I discussed it with Kathleen Fergus, at coffee-fellowship after morning service on Sunday 28th April. To my amazement she thought I should write an article on this for our Church Newsletter. A match was put to the sticks and the fire was alight, so this is the result. With fervency I commence to tell you all, of this exciting experience

Although not familiar with Perth, I was quite impressed when I caught a glimpse of all the lovely shops which I promised myself I would get a closer look at, at some future date. The main thing was to get to the Salutation Hotel on time. My escorts had arrived promptly at my home at 8.30am. Having been up at the crack of dawn, I was all ready and waiting. In no time at all we reached Perth (3/4 hour only). Whilst Ewart was parking the car, Catherine, Bill and myself entered the Salutation Hotel. A cosy lounge meets you. Already quite a few people were there. We took a seat for a few minutes before moving to the hall of considerable size where the meeting was to take place. There were long tables set out with cups, saucers and biscuits beside huge jugs of coffee and tea of which we lost no time in partaking once Ewart joined us!

Comfortable seats were all awaiting us in the hall. The helpers were in the throes of setting up the equipment for wide screens in opposite corners of the hall. It was still only around 9.30am and not due to commence until 9.45am. We all assembled and there must have been well over a hundred people present.

To begin, introductions were made by Rev.Malcolm Rooney and Rev.David Currie.We had readings from the Bible, prayer and a hymn 'As this soul pants' was flashed up on the white screen. Following this we were divided into two large groups, each group in opposite corners of the hall. We four split up so as not to be in the same group. Rev Robert McAlpine took one group and Rev.Malcolm Rooney the other. One wouldn't have known they were ministers as they were dressed quite casually. Both were excellent speakers, talking about the form of evangelism; speaking of ways we could all become better Christians and followers of Jesus Christ, and what new interests we could introduce to the church to encourage people young and old.

They spoke of such ideas as forming groups in the church rather than the conventional gathering we have; workshops by which youngsters could learn new skills; walking clubs; prayer visits to members of the congregation. In fact this matter reminded me very much of our last Lent Study meeting when we all tried to think of ways and means of getting people to come to church, as it is vital that we do or the church is going to sink. Also, they spoke of ways we can make for betterment and they spoke of an open church, a culture change and more activities in church halls. As far as that is concerned I think we do very well. I told them in our group that we had a Lunch Club once a month; Country Dancing and Line Dancing; Brownies, Bell-ringing classes and concerts; Coffee mornings, Book sales; Sales of work; Annual Flower Show; Remembrance Day service held in the hall and beside the War Memorial just outside the hall, enabling us to hold the two minutes silence together with the service more or less on the premises. I mentioned services taken in Nursing homes and at the hospital; that we had Lent and Advent Bible study meetings; sails to Inchcolm in September each year; that we gathered to see the sunrise on Easter morning at 6.30am afterwards rolling Easter eggs in the Castle grounds and that we even had a Ceilidh in our church hall enjoyed by all.

I told my group that Peter Park did his best to bridge the age gap by encouraging the old to mix with the young and that I was 92 and I had never enjoyed myself so much! One young lady in the group said she wished there were more like myself in her church. Very flattering, but then I am known for being 'pushful', am I not?!

In the large group, Robin McAlpine asked each one to give their names, the place they lived and their church. I gave them this information and added that our minister was Peter Park. Robin at once said that he knew Peter. I felt they were much alike in their thinking.

Mid-day we stopped our discussion for a nice buffet lunch laid on for us, then we resumed in groups as before. Robin was asking questions that were printed on the screen. One was, 'What is it most important to believe?' Without any hesitation I called out 'the Resurrection'. This was taken up by Robin and specially marked on the screen. Others took the same view. 'Why did we like coming to church?' was another question. I said it was nice to speak to and to be in the company of people of the same mind; to enjoy the sanctity and peacefulness of the Church surroundings; to listen to the preaching of the minister as well as to the Bible readings and hymns. I always feel uplifted on leaving the church.

Certain chapters of the Bible were put up on the screen ... Matthew 28 vv16-20; Matthew 14 vv14-33; 1 Peter 3; Luke 5 vv 1-7. We all joined hands at the closing and were blessed. I am sure Catherine, Bill and Ewart have much more to add to what I have related. Now I must add my warm thanks to Peter for adding myself to make up the four from St Fillan's; also to Bill, Ewart and Catherine for putting up with me and for their kind attention to my well-being. I enjoyed it all so very much and am now more knowledgeable as to what a 'Church without Walls' means.

Lent Bible Study Group 2002

During the last few years, one of the most 'looked-forward-to' times in the church year, has been the series of five Bible Studies held annually during the time of Lent, in preparation for Easter.

These are ecumenical meetings of village folk from different denominations, meeting together in different local homes, often using material drawn up by 'Churches Together in Britain and Ireland'~.

This year the material was 'Called to be Saints'. The carefully planned course and Bible study took us from the Saints of old, through their work, location and devoted service, to the realisation that we who are disciples of Jesus in 2002 are the saints of today!

Searching questions, leading to lively discussions, made us look, by the end of the course, at the challenges and needs of our own time, our location, our local churches, our community, our outreach and mission.

Religious sites on the Internet There is a proliferation of sites on religious subjects. David Graham, one of our members, came upon one telling Bible stories by using Lego bricks. Internet users may want to view some of the pictures for themselves – www.the reverend.com/brick testament

The Brick Testament – Scripture stories on the Internet

We have probably all seen Bible stories being told with the aid of soft toys but Reverend Brendan Powell Smith uses Lego bricks. He has used them to retell 38 bible stories from the Old and New Testament making scenes from LEGO.

Smith, a 28-year old from San Francisco, with a degree in philosophy and religion (he's not actually a Reverend, but an atheist) chose the bible because he says "it is chock full of fascinating stories". He depicts many stories such as the Flood, the Fall in the Garden of Eden and the Last Supper. Attention to detail is part of Smith's secret and he maintains a policy of strict adherence to the finer points of each story. Each scene is accompanied with the text from the New Jerusalem Bible, Smith says, "it's important for the audience to know that I'm not making this stuff up".

Rachel Harden writing in the Church Times says "Mr Smith is mindful of the sensibilities of visitors to his website. Each story is given ratings N for nudity, S for sexual consent, V for violence and C for cursing". But I think it is a bit tongue-in-cheek, as I don't think a few yellow LEGO bricks put together depicting the baby Jesus could offend any one. On the other hand, we often skip over some of the more difficult parts of the bible, like all the people drowning in the story of the Flood and Herod killing the babies. It makes you see the stories in a new light."

Every scene is made entirely out of Lego. All the bricks used are off the-peg, although Mr Smith says he sometimes had to modify them with a knife or marker pen and the subtle modulations in body language among the Lego disciples is astonishing. Smith's favourite story is the Flood, "It gave me the opportunity to build all sorts of animals, the ark itself, and a big rainbow at the end. Plus it was fun to show God drowning everybody."

Warning - even though this site may not offend, links to it may cause offence.
