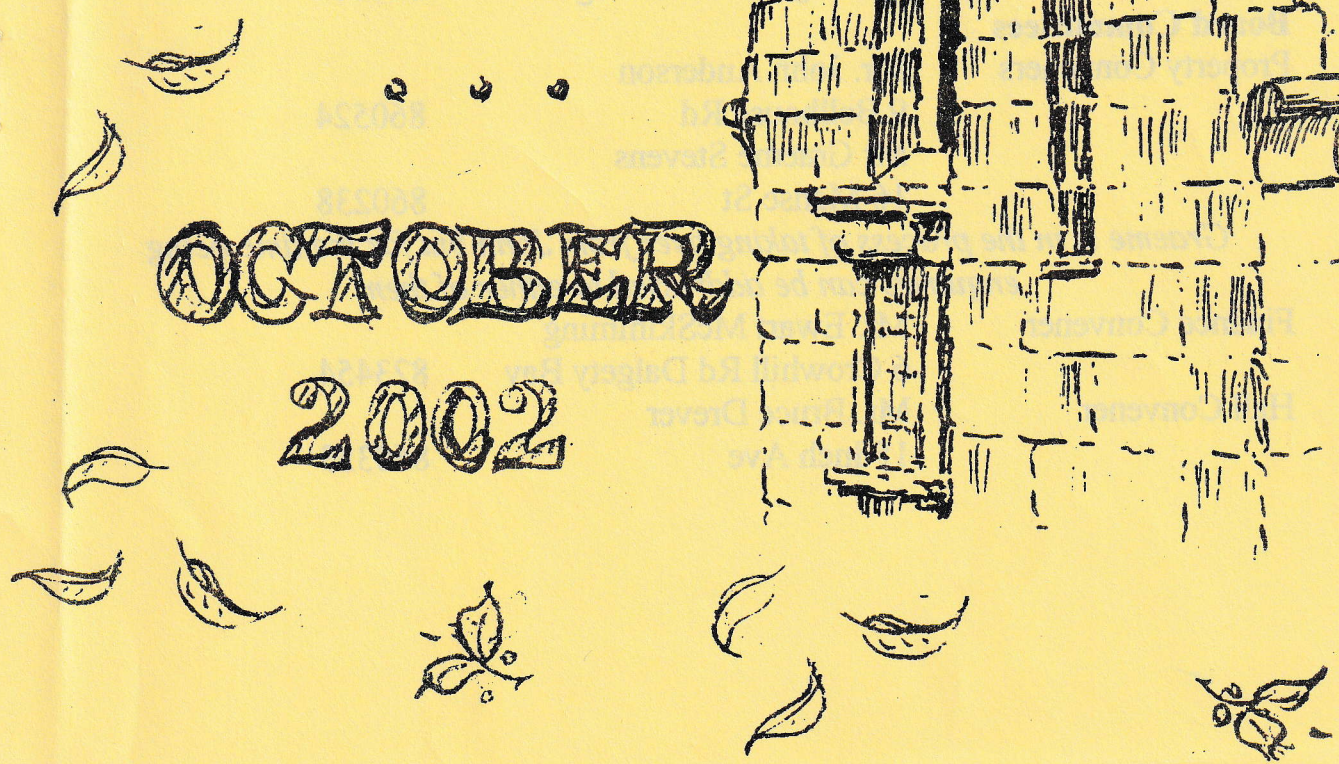

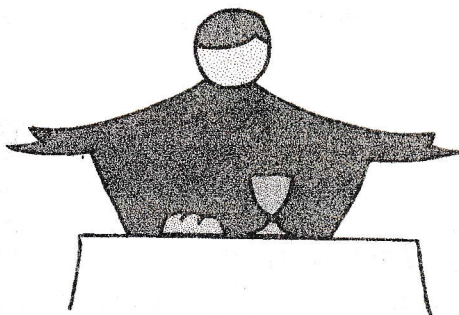

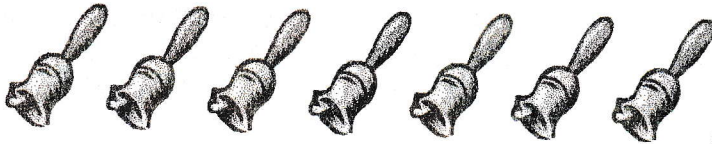

St Fillan's Handbell Ringers

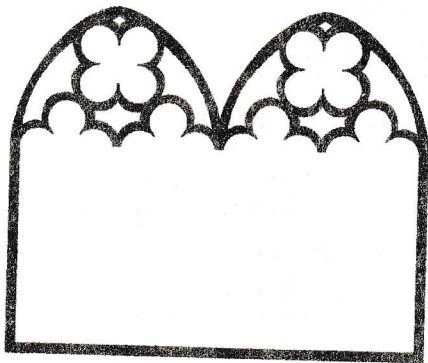

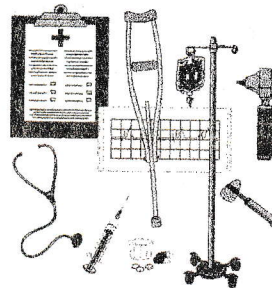
Annual pilgrimage to Inchcolm

At the end of the service the minister announced that (unless we heard to the contrary) the trip was still on and encouraged all to attend. However, as we left church at 11.30, to be blasted by hailstones and having to wade through the flooding on the path many wondered whether we would be going or not.

But by mid afternoon the bad weather had passed over, the sun was out, the firth was calm, the boat arrived on time and 131 of us had a smashing afternoon out on the island.

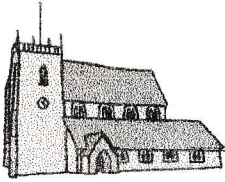

Some Churches and Cathedrals visited in 2002 – Margaret Smith

In April I visited Glamis Castle and its little chapel in the heart of the castle where many photographs of the Queen Mother were discreetly displayed.

In May, to St Michael's parish church in Linlithgow, with its distinctive "crown" visible from many miles distance. There are many beautiful old tapestries, now framed to preserve them, and a new big round window, completed in 1992, a glorious mass of colour and symbols, all well described in information leaflets in the church.

In Stirling castle I saw the Chapel Royal, fairly modern inside and very light and airy. There are several embroidered Alter Covers available for use, the one used that day commemorated the Dunblane (just up the road as Stirling people say) primary school tragedy of 1996 and incorporated sixteen small stars and one large one (one for each person killed). Across the courtyard from the Chapel royal is the recently restored Great Hall. Not a church or chapel, but awe-inspiring. To look up at the wonderful new roof of Scottish oak reminded me very much of the roof in St Fillan's. The only adornment on the walls is a picture of 2 unicorns, embroidered by specialist members of the embroiders' guild, chosen from all over Scotland.

In June I visited Caithness and Orkney with a friend of many years who knew the area well. We crossed the Pentland Firth, very calm on the day, landed at Burwick then over the Churchill barriers to the Italian chapel. This is formed from 2 Nisson huts and the information booklet narrates its "building, decoration and preservation is a tribute to the goodwill of a POW camp commander, the pastoral concern of the padre and the genius of the prisoners"

Then I went onto St Magnus Cathedral in Kirkwall. This is a wonderful building both outside and inside. There are old and new stained glass windows, a tapestry from Norway to the people of Orkney, presented by the King of Norway to the Queen Mother, many plaques to the folk who had given of their time, their interest, and their monies to Orkney, Kirkwall and the 800 year old cathedral In the choir is a poignant memorial in memory of the 1800 sailors drowned in Scapa Flow in 1939 when HMS Royal Oak was sunk by enemy action. Coming back on the ferry a tape was played about the tragedy of the Longhope lifeboat and it was hard to believe that the peaceful water we were crossing could be so cruel at times

Next along the north coast of Scotland, a trip to Durness graveyard followed by a visit to Canisby parish church. I was last there some years ago with my late husband when we visited the then minister of the parish who had officiated at our wedding in Perthshire. The Queen Mother used to be a regular attender at Canisby when staying at the castle of Mey.

South to Dornoch Cathedral, another gem of architecture with its lovely stained glass windows. The choir and Communion table chairs have beautifully worked tapestry cushions, including one of the burning bush.

Back in Aberdour to St Columba's church, a warm welcome to view the display by local artists and later that week their flower festival

And finally to the flower festival in St Fillan's. How I admire the people who grow and arrange such lovely blooms. It was a pleasure and privilege to take a turn at stewarding and hear the admiring remarks of visitors to the church. The church information boards were well used and the taped music playing in the background much appreciated.

1st A Aberdour Guide Colours

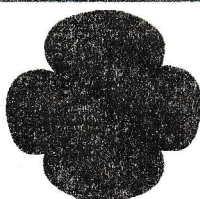
Our old and well loved company colour is now showing the passage of time. We are hoping to dedicate a new one and decommission the old colour as part of our Thinking Day Celebrations in February.

Printer Cartridges, mobile phones and aluminium cans wanted

From Lesley Gordon (one of our members and a teacher at Inverkeithing High School)



The John Muir Award scheme goes from strength to strength at Inverkeithing High School with work at Lochore meadows and Townhill country parks. The pupils receive 3 levels of award for their strenuous efforts in the environment with the highlight of the year being a trip to Ardroy (west coast of Scotland) in July.

There the pupils work in the Atlantic oak woodland and monitor the population of small mammals like voles and wood mice. Additionally there are fun activities like kayaking, gorge walking and abseiling as well as staying for 2 night in a bothy on the shores of Loch Long. This is a very valuable experience for teenagers teaching independence and self reliance as well as building team spirit. 2 pupils this year were only able to go to Ardroy with the help of fundraising by recycling ink jet cartridges from computers and aluminium cans which they crush in school. The enjoyment gained by these pupils was obvious. It was the only summer holiday they got this year and neither of them wanted to come home such was their enjoyment of the whole experience.

This year in addition to recycling printer cartridges, the company 'Office Green' have begun a scheme to recycle mobile phones as well. Any of these recyclable items can be brought to me at 82 Main St, left behind the front wall at that address, or I can come and collect them from you.

Please help if you can – there are 4 pupils this year who have already started to raise funds for Ardroy by recycling and are hoping for your help

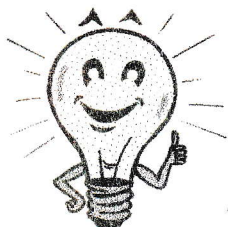
Queen Margaret Hospital.

We continued over the past year to provide support to the Chaplaincy at the hospital for Sunday services. This requires our volunteers to inform patients of the service and where required provide patients with wheel chair support to and from the service~ We have currently 20 volunteers including members of our Bible class who attend on a rota system at 6 services during the year in the hospital. This means that volunteers would attend on average 3 services in the year. The procedure is we are required to report at 1015 and register in the Chaplains office and obtain an identification badge, the service starts at 1100 and lasts for 30 minutes and we would normally complete our tasks by 1200 before returning home.

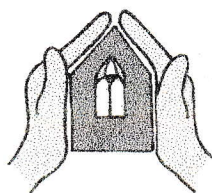
Henderson House Nursing Home.

We currently have a rota of 12 volunteers split into two groups who attended 10 Tuesday services during the past year The service is held every two weeks but as this programme is shared with Dalgety Church it means that St Fillan's leads worship on every 3rd occasion or once every 6 weeks. The service starts at 2.00 pm. and lasts for approx. 20 minutes we sing some hymns and the Minister, or someone else, gives a short talk and leads prayers. Afterwards time is spent with the residents and a cheerful face is more important than singing for this worship time.

The Pastoral Group is most appreciative of the time given by our current list of volunteers. However, as we are currently considering extending our outreach mission we are looking for additional volunteers before making any commitments. If you feel you could give some time to any or all of our outreach programmes then we would be most pleased to hear from you. 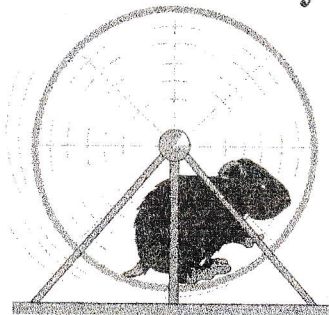

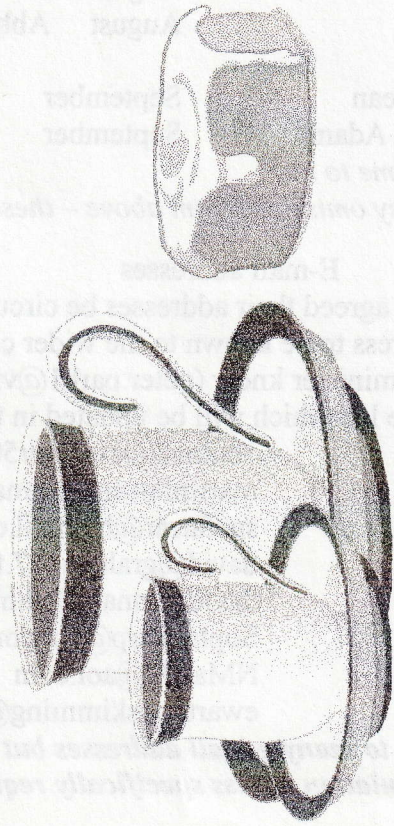

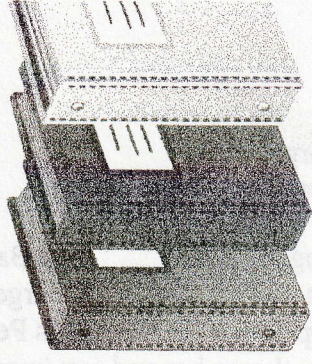
