THE CONCEPT OF PARISH GROUPING

IN MAY 2003 the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland passed a new act with respect to the Appraisal and Adjustment of Charges.

Amongst other matters the Act introduced a new provision for adjustment known as "Parish Groupings". It is this concept that has been the subject of discussion between the Kirk Session, Presbytery and the parishes of Dalgety, Inverkeithing St Peter's, Inverkeithing St John's and North Queensferry.

It has been made clear to us that decisions with respect to Grouping will affect Presbytery's decisions concerning St Fillan's Call for a new Minister. This article seeks to explain what is envisaged should the parishes decide to proceed along these lines. Nothing, as at 10 September, is yet decided.

The concept, as presently discussed, involves the participating parishes seeing group ministry as a means by which they can be more effective in touching lives with the love and goodness of God. Key factors are: -

- ✓ The territorial bounds to be served by the Parish Grouping will be the same as currently served by the constituent congregations.
- ✓ Property and Funds shall remain with each congregation as at present.
- ✓ The moderator of each Kirk Session will normally be the minister called by that congregation.
- ✓ There may be joint annual meetings of the group's Kirk Sessions to review and plan the joint ministry.
- ✓ The temporal affairs of each congregation shall be administered as at present.
- ✓ Office bearers meeting annually to decide financial matters relating to the activities of parish grouping. (For instance, the funding of a group youth worker)
- ✓ The Ministry team shall comprise the ministers of the collaborating parishes.
- ✓ Ministers' stipends will be, as at present, sanctioned by Presbytery. Other salaries will be as agreed by the relevant General Assembly Committees and Boards.
- ✓ The collaborating congregations will commit themselves to work together in the following areas: -
 - Mission (Including Youth Work)
 - Worship
 - Pastoral
 - Education
 - Communication.

Details of work in these areas would be drawn up in a "Schedule" to be agreed between the constituent congregations. The Kirk Session of St Fillan's has accepted the Basis described above and now awaits the views of the other parishes before putting matters further to the congregation.

The man at the "kist 0' whustles"



OVER THE YEARS prospective brides have appeared in the organ loft for music advice on their "Big Day", particularly with the entrance and exit music, which can be wide and various.

But for many the hymn choice was firm "the ones my mother had at her wedding" and to many this included the hymn '0 perfect love'. Even in the days when a larger part of the community took part in kirk worship

and congregational singing, the choice of '0 perfect love', was always a problem.

The words would seem entirely suitable for the occasion but the tune, although very fine, was not one sung regularly and therefore proved difficult at weddings. Never the less it proved popular for many years and even now comes to the surface, ("my mother's choice at her wedding").

The text was by Dorothy Frances Gurney (1858 - 1932) and the music by Joseph Barnby (1838 - 1896). Joseph Barnby wrote this not easily sung but beautiful tune. He was an English composer, conductor and organist who did pioneer works introducing Bach's "passions" to English audiences.

Dorothy was a poet, and a quote recently drew to my attention, attributed to her: -

"The kiss of the sun for pardon, The song of the birds for mirth, One is nearer God's heart in a garden Than anywhere else on earth"

Could I have some volunteer songsters for the 'choir box' for the winter season? Please come and see me.

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
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WHERE ARE ST. FILLAN'S LOST SHEEP?

WE ARE ALL FAMILIAR with the parable in St. Matthew's Gospel in Chapter 18 of the Lost Sheep and at St. Fillan's we have lost some as well. Not one, as Jesus spoke about, but 265 to be exact! That is the number on our roll who do not regularly contribute to Church Funds from a total of 416 (31^{st} Dec 02).

The church in Aberdour exists not just for members but also for the people of the village but it cannot do so unless the office bearers can plan ahead safe in the knowledge that funds for various activities are in place. Apart from the normal uses for services, weddings, baptisms and funerals, the church through its halls acts as a community centre for Parents and Toddlers, Mucky Pups, Scouts, Lunch Club, Country Dancing, Line Dancing, Flower Shows, Coffee Mornings to name but a few. Lots of these activities are self-supporting and indeed contribute generously to church funds but the need for on going repairs and refurbishment necessitates a requirement for a regular source of funds.

The easiest way for the church to achieve this is by regular giving of members committed by Weekly Freewill Offering in every possible case gift-aided to increase the value of the person's contribution by 28%.

Are you one of the 265? If you are will you please reconsider your vows of membership to give of "your time, your talents and your treasures". This is not all about money however. ALEX ARMSTRONG

(An elder at St. Fillan's 1970 to 2003) Reproduced by kind permission of Rev. John Scott

ALEX WAS BORN in Lesmahagow in 1908, the son of the local butcher, though he was only two years old when his parents and he along with his two sisters emigrated to New Zealand, South Island, where he was brought up and received most of his education. A school report of 1922 recorded "excellent in arithmetic, rather slow at woodwork" which I suppose is why he became a banker rather than a carpenter.

When the father died in 1923 the family returned to Scotland, to Wishaw, where Alex completed his education before starting his apprenticeship with the Commercial Bank with a salary of £40 per annum. The letter appointing him told him to report the following day and expressed the hope that his handwriting would improve, though I gather it never did. A posting to London included the war years but in 1951 he returned to Scotland, to Paisley, where he looked after his mother after the marriages of his two sisters until she died.


He was a member of Elderslie Golf Club and it was there that he met Nell and married her in 1956, enjoying 43 very happy years together until Nell died in 1999. In 1957 Alex was appointed manager at the Lochgelly branch, when they both joined Aberdour Golf Club which was to become very much a part of their lives. On retirement in 1969 it seemed natural that they move to Aberdour where they both became a part of the social and church life of the village and where their home became a place of welcome and warm hospitality.

Alex became a member of the Kirk Session of St. Fillan's in 1970, a diligent elder in his attendance at meetings and in his district, while Nell became an enthusiastic member of the choir and the Guild. I seem to be saying as much about Nell as about Alex but that's how they were in life - devoted to each other and enjoying one another's company, sharing many of the same interests, particularly the golf club where Alex was secretary for a number of years.

While his woodworking skills at school may not have received acclamation, they were put to good use in the golf club in many ways, most noticeably in providing a place for the junior golfers.

In January 2001 his increasing frailty meant going into care, in Levenglen Nursing home where he received that devoted care which made his last few years comfortable and satisfying. His passing was peaceful and the memories he leaves are good and in the main happy.






