

Especially for parents

Is there a magic cut off period when offspring become accountable for their own actions? Is there a wonderful moment when parents can become detached spectators in the lives of their children and shrug, "It's their life." and feel nothing?

When I was in my twenties, I stood in a hospital corridor waiting for doctors to put a few stitches in my son's head. I asked, "When do you stop worrying?" The nurse said, "When they get out of the accident stage." My mother just smiled faintly and said nothing.

When I was in my thirties, I sat on a little chair in a classroom and heard how one of my children talked incessantly, disrupted the class, and was headed for a career making license plates. As if to read my mind, a teacher said, "Don't worry, they all go through this stage and then you can sit back, relax and enjoy them." My mother just smiled faintly and said nothing.

When I was in my forties, I spent a lifetime waiting for the phone to ring, the cars to come home, the front door to open. A friend said, "They're trying to find themselves. Don't worry, in a few years, you can stop worrying. They'll be adults." My mother just smiled faintly and said nothing.

By the time I was 50, I was sick & tired of being vulnerable. I was still worrying over my children, but there was a new wrinkle. There was nothing I could do about it. My mother just smiled faintly and said nothing. I continued to anguish over their failures, be tormented by their frustrations and absorbed in their disappointments.

My friends said that when my kids got married I could stop worrying and lead my own life. I wanted to believe that, but I was haunted by my mother's warm smile and her occasional, "You look pale. Are you all right? Call me the minute you get home. Are you depressed about something?" Can it be that parents are sentenced to a lifetime of worry?

Is concern for one another handed down like a torch to blaze the trail of human frailties and the fears of the unknown? Is concern a curse or is it a virtue that elevates us to the highest form of life?

One of my children became quite irritable recently, saying to me, "Where were you? I've been calling for 3 days, and no one answered. I was worried." I smiled a warm smile. The torch has been passed.

PASS this ON TO OTHER PARENTS (and also to your children. That's the fun part)

## A nostalgic look back on the 'old days' Here's something about the 'toughness' of being born before 1980

Kids of today are wrapped in cotton wool....... Read on....

If you lived as a child in the 50's, 60's or 70's, looking back, it's hard to believe that we have lived as long as we have... As children, we would ride in cars with no seat belts or air bags. Our cots were covered with bright coloured lead-based paint. We had no childproof lids on medicine bottles, doors, or cupboards, when we rode our bikes we had no helmets. We drank water from the garden hose and not from a bottle. We would spend hours building go-carts out of scraps and then ride down the hill; only to find out we forgot the brakes. After running into the bushes a few times we learned to solve the problem. We would leave home in the morning and play all day, as long as we were back when the streetlights came on. No one was able to reach us all day. On Sundays we all went to Sunday school and our parents went to Church. No mobile phones. We got cut and broke bones and broke teeth, and there were no lawsuits from these accidents. They were accidents. No one was to blame, but us. Remember accidents? We had fights and punched each other and got black and blue and learned to get over it. We ate cakes, bread and butter, and drank cordial, but we were never overweight...we were always outside playing. We shared one drink with four friends, from one bottle and no one died from this. We did not have Play stations, Nintendo 64, X-Boxes, video games, 65 channels on pay TV, video tape movies, surround sound, personal mobile phones, Personal Computers, Internet chat rooms ... we had friends. We went outside and found them. We rode bikes or walked to a friend's home and knocked on the door, or rung the bell, or just walked in and talked to them. Imagine such a thing. Without asking a parent! By ourselves! Out there in the cold cruel world! Without a guardian - how did we do it? We made up games with sticks and tennis balls, and ate worms, and although we were told it would happen, we did not put out very many eyes, nor did the worms live inside us forever. Footy and netball had tryouts and not everyone made the team. Those who didn't, had to learn to deal with disappointment... Some pupils weren't as smart as others so they failed an exam and were held back to repeat the same year. Tests were not adjusted for any reason. Our actions were our own. Consequences were expected. No one to hide behind. The idea of a parent bailing us out if we broke a law was unheard of. They actually sided with the law, even when a Policeman had clipped your ear, or brought you home to get a 'hiding' from your parents - imagine that! This generation has produced some of the best risk-takers and problem solvers and inventors, ever. The past 50 years has been an explosion of innovation and new ideas. We had freedom, failure, success and responsibility, and we learned how to deal with it all. And you're one of them. Congratulations! Please pass this on to others who have had the luck to grow up as kids, before lawyers and government regulated our lives, before God got lost in the maze of life and we lost faith...for our own good....

#### Homestart Central Fife (HCF)

St Fillan's has long supported the work of HCF.

This article seeks to give readers an idea of the work of this very worthwhile charity.


HCF, based in Lochgelly, is one of 18 schemes, aimed at children of pre-school age, forming Home-start Scotland. It is supported entirely by grants and voluntary donations and works through a very small paid staff, its committee and most importantly its 25 active home-visiting volunteers. In 2002 97 families were supported by the scheme; 44 families received volunteer support and 73 attended the family group meetings

The main thrust of their work centers on volunteer workers who work with families in their homes, providing informal parenting advice and links between homes and schools. Last summer a programme of activities, which it is hoped to continue throughout the year, provided a useful focus for children who might otherwise be unoccupied.

A substance misuse group has been working to remove barriers and help mothers who feel reluctant to approach the official social work organization. This has been another good example of how Home-start works in partnership with agencies to the benefit of the child and family. A crèche is provided which benefits not only the parents who might need respite, but also the children, who learn how to play and to share and to gain new experiences. Each child has a key worker who deals specifically with the child's progress and discusses this with the parent.

#### "CHANGING YOUR LIFE WITH NEW FRIENDS



'Friends First' is an organisation that assists single Christians to meet new friends and potential partners. It was established in early 2000 in Birmingham with the support of many church leaders. Katharine Gray, the coordinator, has recently written to us telling us that it continues to go from strength to strength as people of all ages find new friendships really do change their lives. Katharine says that the feedback she receives from happy members says it all: 'I know I joined 'Friends First' to meet other people, but I cannot believe what is happening in my life. I did not anticipate meeting someone so lovely as Felicity and that we would get on so well. If I have learnt anything over the last year it is that it is only when you take a risk, only when you do something different, do you allow God to start working in your life."

Membership continues to grow as the organisation attracts men and women in their 20's to their 80's (and everything in between), from all walks of life - both professionals and non professionals, single people and people who've been married before.

Although it can seem daunting to join something like this, it is a friendly, discrete and confidential service. Moreover the organisation is founded on the principles of security, integrity and discretion. #### Cash Gifts

From time to time we receive anonymous cash donations in our offering plate.

However if the donors are willing (and able) to make their dona

However if the donors are willing (and able) to make their donations through the Gift Aid scheme the church would benefit further from the donation by being able to claim a further 28p in every £1 from the Inland Revenue.

This means that when someone gives us £50 we can claim a further £14; when someone gives £100 a further £28 and so on.

Gift Aid can apply to one off and/or regular donations and if the donor identifies him or her self we can usually make retrospective claims. 
#### **Prayer Requests**
