THE VACANCY - A PROGRESS REPORT



AS MOST OF YOU KNOW the Rev. John Murdoch preached on 18 April as sole nominee for the current vacancy at St. Fillan's and was duly elected by an overwhelming majority in the vote which followed the service. Dunfermline Presbytery accepted the call and matters progressed to the stage that provisional arrangements had

been made for a service of Induction in June subject to some formalities being completed.

However, as the Newsletter goes to press (20 May) we have heard that the Rev Murdoch is unable to accept the call for personal reasons. While there is no reason why we should not be able to proceed with a call to St. Fillan's, the way in which this will happen are not known. Hopefully by the time you receive the Newsletter some progress will have been made on this matter.

THE CHURCH ROOF AND PHASE 2 OF THE CHURCH RENOVATION



THE SLATES ON THE ROOF of the Church are delaminating because when the Church was reroofed in 1926 the slates were bedded in mortar. Roof slates expand and contract according to the heat or cold of the weather, but because the undersides of the St. Fillan's slates are fixed in mortar and unable to move, this has caused the slates to split apart internally. Historic Scotland and Church experts

are agreed that replacement is now necessary, before damage is done to the interior of the roof. At the same time there is much re-pointing required on all sides, except the West which was repaired under Phase 1 of our Renovation Scheme.

The estimated cost of Phase 2 is £140,000. Future uncertainties include the true nature of any damage and how many of the existing tiles can be reused. We have received a grant of up to £70,000 from Historic Scotland (the Heritage Lottery Fund has been unable to help). With the Church Renovation Fund currently standing at £71,697, we have been able to initiate work. After a competitive tender Tod Taylor have been appointed as our architects. Further fund-raising may well be necessary as the project progresses.

WHEEL-CHAIR ACCESS TO THE CHURCH AND VESTRY



BY OCTOBER 2004 the law requires that we make all reasonable provision for disabled access to our buildings. The criteria being what is reasonable in the circumstances of each site in terms of both finance, practicability and in the case of the Church particularly, historic importance.

Following advice from Historic Scotland and the Church of Scotland's Artistic Matters Committee, we have purchased two portable ramps. These will allow for wheel-chair access to the Church through the door into the Chancel and thence down the steps, past the font, into the nave. It is a simple matter for one, or better two, people to set up the ramps in about five minutes.

Planned improvements to the Vestry will include consideration of the provision of wheelchair access to the toilet facilities.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY 2004 EXTRACTS FROM REPORT OF BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP AND FINANCE

Availability of Financial Resources

This section of the report highlights matters of financial significance or concern, both one-off projects and ongoing areas of work. These include the Tiberias Development, the Netherbow Development, Social Responsibility, Communications and Pensions.

The Church of Scotland's three Pension Schemes are a matter of great concern. The three schemes continued to show very large deficits at the end of 2003. While stock market values increased in 2003, a more prudent actuarial allowance for mortality increased the liabilities of the Pension Schemes.

Conclusion

The last four years have been extremely difficult in financial terms for the Church of Scotland. Central expenditure has exceeded income by £19 million. Investments have reduced in market value by over £35 million. Many Boards and Committees are incurring deficits and using reserves to maintain existing work. The Board of World Mission is having to cut back on some areas of work as a result of investment in its Tiberias development. The Church's Pension Schemes have moved from an actuarial valuation surplus of £8 million at the end of 2000 to a deficit of £56 million at the end of 2003 (in Financial Reporting Standard 17 terms).

As costs increase, deficits mount, reserves dwindle and membership falls, it is imperative that urgent strategic action is taken to address and resolve the problems inherent in the Rolling Budget. This should involve an examination of the money spent on Church buildings and Parish Staffing.

At the same time, the need to teach and practise sacrificial giving throughout the Church is paramount.

SPECIAL COLLECTIONS AND CONGREGATIONAL GIVING

The retiring collections after the March Communion services raised £293.55. This sum was given to Chernobyl Children Lifeline, Dunfermline and West Fife Link. The 10 children will be arriving in June and our donation goes to ensuring they have a summer in Scotland that they will never forget.

The retiring collection for the June Communions will be for the Bethany Christian Trust, Dunfermline Project. This project, based behind Viewforth Terrace, provides a drop-in centre where people who have nowhere to sleep, often with problems of drug addiction or mental health, can come for help, advice, hot drinks, food parcels, clothing and toiletries. In 2003 there were 3577 visits by 410 individuals. The project needs £20,000 a year to this end.

END APRIL 2003 FINANCIAL STATEMENT

The budget for this year forecasts a zero balance. To the end of April 2004 Congregational Income totalled £17,716. This was £916 less than budget.

A NEW SCHEME FOR GIVING TO CHARITY

FROM APRIL 2004, individuals who complete Self Assessment Tax Returns areable to nominate a Charity to receive all or part of any repayment due to them. St Fillan's Church is a registered charity under this scheme.

The Tax Return form incorporates a Gift Aid Declaration and Gift Aid tax on this donation will be paid without the Charity having to make a claim. Donations will be paid directly to the Charity's bank account.

THE ABERDOUR MORTCLOTH (From the Aberdour Kirk Session Records researched by Miss Stewart, Hawcraig Road).

The Mortcloth was a Pall used to cover the Coffin at a funeral and was hired from the Kirk Session - the money gathered in this way was used to help the poor of the village. The matter exercised the minds of the Kirk Sesison on manjoccasions all these years ago.

27th March 1723.

This day it was enacted that any man who keeps (looks after) the mortcloth shall not presume to give the Best mortcloth to any that live on Charity or are in a mean condition without the advice of two or three of the Elders otherwise he must pay for it himself.

16th March 1728.

This day the new mortcloth bought at Edinburgh on the first of this instant was brought before the Session, view'd and approv'n. It was bought from one David Spence. The Quantity was Imprimis 8 ½ yds, of black velvet at 18 shillings per yard which amounted to seven pounds and thirteen shillings sterling. Item five ¾ yards of Black Shalloon at Eighteen pence per yard which amounted to Eight shillings seven pence halfpenny. The whole was Eight pounds one shilling sevenpence halfpenny for all which the Session has his Discharge.

1st March 1756.

The Session in consideration of their best mortcloth being some worn and having in their last sederunt lowered the price of it from five shillings to four shillings their having this day resolved to purchase a new one which is to be let out at a (...ron) to the Session and the Minr. Resolving to go to Edinburgh they have given him fifteen pounds in order to buy it.


20th July, 1787.

The Minister represented that he had laid the bad state of the Mortcloths before a meeting of the Heritors of yesterday the 24th instant and that the said meeting authorized him and the Session to purchase; either the Hammermens Mortcloths or new ones as they shall see proper for which the Heritors will pay. The Session appoint David Anderson and Lawrence Balingal to commune with the Hammermen and to acquaint the Minr. Of the lowest prices at which they are willing to dispose of their Mortcloths.

My input to the church service this past month has been mostly on the music of Handel and Bach and I have had so he comthents.

I did of course 'slip in' one or two pieces that caused more than a ripple i.e., Howard Goodall's version of the 23rd psalm, a few head scratching, "I just know that piece" (T.V. Addicts of 'Vicar of Dibley).

And the Sunday prior to Christian Aid Week a hymn setting of the 'Lords Prayer' music by Paul Simon 'The Sound of Silence'.

At the climax of the weekly service to serve the Dominican community of Los Peres the congregation stands with linked hands to sing the Lord's prayer. It is sung in Spanish to the tune of the 'Sound of Silence', the 1966 song performed by Simon and Garfunkel.

In the Dominican Republic it is sung to a simple guitar accompaniment. Between the second and third verses the guitar continues and the words of the Lord's prayer are read in Creole, the first language of Haitian members of the congregation.

St. Fillan's did the English version of the concept.

(It maybe also of interest that the hymn 'silent night' was first hears to the accompaniment of a guitar as a mouse had decided to make a meal of the organ bellows, just before the church service).

There are also several other pieces of music stamped in the public's minds, such as:-

Bach:	Air on a 'G' string - the infamous' Hamlet' cigar advert.
Vivaldi	Allegro from the Four Seasons Autumn - T. V. play Casanova
Khatchaturian	Theme from Spartacus - The Onedin Line
Moussorgsky	Promenade - Bank of Scotland
Beethoven	Theme from the Choral Symphony - film Clockwork Orange
Mozart	A Musical Joke - Horse of The Year Show with his Symphony No. 40 captured by International Showjumping.

My own favourite: (for those of a more mature age) the film serial as a boy watching the cowboy Hopalong Cassdiy galloping over the desert to the opening music of Mendelssohn's The Hebrides and Fingal's Cave with it's crashing waves.

Although I must admit that it was a good few years later at a musical lecture during my national service, that I actually' cottoned on'.

With music adapted in this way, a good or bad thing? I leave it to you. As a musician I tend to skirt around playing them, or risk "I know that tune".

P.S. Again thanks to Eileen and Norman Macdonald for supplying the 'Music Kist' to the organ loft. It must have been a real wrench Norman".

Answer to the Perfect Number Square

Each line totals 33, the age Jesus was reputed to be when he died on the cross. The squares appear at several locations on the Temple de la Sagrada Damilia in Barcelona. It is claimed that a total of 33 can be counted in up to 310 different ways.

Construction of the cathedral started in 1882 and still continues today. It is a major tourist attraction in Barcelona and provides magnificent views of the city.
